ORATORICAL CONTEST HERE

JUNE 20TH

ORATORS FROM THE UNIVERSITIES OF OREGON, WASHINGTON AND IDAHO WILL SPEAK IN EUGENE—HENRY McKINNEY WILL REPRESENT OREGON—SILVER CUP MEET

The contestants for the tri-state oratorical contest which will be held in Eugene June 20 among the Universities of Oregon, Washington and Oregon, have been chosen by the various institutions. Oregon will be represented by Henry McKinney, who graduated this year, Washington by a student named Erickson, and Idaho by a crack debater named Frazier. McKinney's subject is "President," Erickson's, "Powers of the Press," and Frazier's, "Problems of the Twentieth Century." The judges have not yet been chosen.

The occasion is the most important oratorical contest of the year in the Northwest, and great interest is taken by the three states. Sophomore-Freshmen. The third and deciding meet of the series, which will decide which class shall have the fine silver cup offered by the track management, will come off tomorrow at Kincaid field. The first meet was won by the Sophomores, the second by the Freshmen. The Freshmen will have tomorrow on their team such men as Huston, the sprinter, Dodson, the half-mile man, and Kiltz, the sprinter. The Sophomores will have Fred Moulton and Obertanfer, of the first team.

Dormitory Ball Game. Last night in an interesting game the third floor boys of the dormitory beat the second floor in a game of baseball by the score of 8 to 4. Comparatively few errors were made, but those that did occur were costly, for few hits were made off the pitchers. A considerable crowd attended the game. This evening an all-dormitory team will play a team composed of members of the track team. The contest began at 4 o'clock.

Swimming Race. A swimming race is scheduled for tomorrow from the head of the race to the Elgin street bridge. Forfeits, it is understood, have been posted and all preparations made. Who the contestants are has not been given out, but they are said to be two Portland students.

STEAMER LEGGETT LEAVES YACUINA

The steamer Leggett passed out over the bar at high tide at 9 o'clock Thursday forenoon. Mr. Walsh, of the C. & E., reports, with 1,500,000 feet of lumber, drawing approximately 18 feet of water. The trip in and out was made safely and easily.

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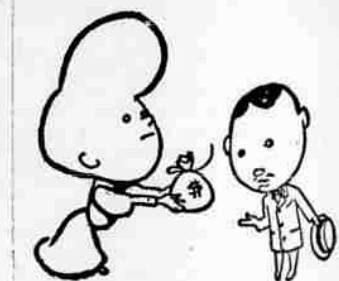
