FLAG DAY FRIDAY, JUNE FOURTEENTH

Local Post of the G. A. R. Requests Residents of Eugene to Display the National Colors on That Date. The History of the Stars and Stripes

J. F. Gates, patriotic instructor of J. W. Geary Post, G. A. R., of this city, has handed the Guard the following for publication:
Friday, the 14th of June, will be the one hundred and thirtieth anniversary of the birth of the flag of the United States. The flag was designed for a nation of thirteen colonies, stretched like a belt along the Atlantic coast, made up of less than three million people without common traditions or language; drawn together only by common danger by savages from without, and oppression from within, which threatened their existence and liberty. That flag now waves over a great nation, extending from the Gulf of Mexico to the lakes, from the Atlantic to the Pacific sea, and inhabited by nearly ninety millions of people, who speak a common language.

Our flag is now—in form—the oldest flag of civilized nations. The resolution by congress for the adoption of the Stars and Stripes on June 14th, 1777, was as follows: "Resolved, That the flag of the United States be thirteen stripes, alternate red and white; that the Union be thirteen stars, white, in a blue field, representing a new constellation." The design of this flag is credited to George Washington, and in part was taken from his family coat of arms. Such is the origin of the flag dedicated to the proposition that "all men are created free and equal." Let us honor the natal day of our flag—displaying it from all our public buildings, schools and homes in recognition of this memorable day.

The men of the Grand Army of the Republic, who preserved the nation in the greatest war of modern times and made vital the declaration of our fathers, call upon all who live under the flag to recognize this day by patriotic observances in schools and on the Sunday preceding—in churches. To this end we suggest that the governor of every state by proclamation announce the day and promote its recognition; that the press scatter this call—as seeds of patriotism—broadcast over the land. Such recognition will nourish the greatest of our nation, inculcate noble patriotism, the principles of civil liberty, and be an object lesson to the new generations that have come upon the stage since the civil war.

A request to the people of the city of Eugene will be published within a few days asking them to display the flag at their places of business and their residences on flag day. Let the display be general.

ORCHARD STILL UNDER CROSS EXAMINATION

(Continued from Page 7.)

shot the first time, but Orchard did not hear what it was. The defense, after leaving the Gregory matter, disagreed for a moment to lay the foundation for showing that Simpkins, because he was in Idaho in the bull pen, and Orchard, because he was driven out of Idaho and forced to sell his interest in the Hercules mine, which later became very valuable property, had a deep grudge against Governor Steunenberg.

At several points the defense laid the foundation for controversion of Orchard's testimony when its side of the case is reached.

Orchard said that at that time Haywood told him to pull off something in Cripple Creek, because he was afraid there would be a split in the miners' convention unless some thing was done; things were very quiet in Cripple Creek and the union had sent committees to the governor to urge that there was no further need of troops.

Richardson endeavored to get Orchard to contradict this statement, but the witness was unshaken. Orchard next testified that he might have had relations with Detectives Scott and Sterling at the time of the independence explosion, and created something of a sensation at this point by adding arson to his list of crimes. He said he and Johnny Neville burned Neville's saloon by setting it afire with Pettibone dynamite. Neville got \$600 insurance, of which he gave \$100 to Orchard. Moyer nor

Pettibone had nothing to do with this, Orchard declared.

After some questions which disclosed the fact that Orchard had sent money to his first wife and had bought a suit of clothes to wear at the trial, an adjournment of court was taken until Monday morning.

Story Not Shaken.

Men who have taken part in or reported court proceedings for a long time and have been present during the hearing of many great criminal cases, declared last evening that they never saw a star witness stand a rattling fire of cross-examination as well as Harry Orchard did. Mr. Richardson scored on some minor points, but all his carefully laid plans to surprise the witness into contradiction failed. Once or twice Orchard made a mistake. Then he deliberately went back and corrected himself.

The defense made nothing of the day's work, unless it was of some value to them to show that this man, who committed murder as he would follow any other occupation for pay, was also in the habit of gambling, that he stole ore, that he sometimes lied to some persons with whom he associated himself when it suited his purpose, and that he even took money from a detective when he felt that he had been mistreated by his associates in the matter of employment to wreck a train. Orchard stuck fast to his story with perfect coolness throughout all the hours of the ordeal.

What Others Say of Orchard.

Woolner, Ont.—Relative of a white superintendent of the Methodist Sunday school he betrayed woman of congregation, burned cheese factory sold cheese hurriedly and fled with Hattie Simpson, deserting wife and girl baby.

Denver, Col.—Max Mallich, at whose

saloon Orchard said he had stored 40 pounds of dynamite with which to blow up Judge Godard, denies story, but admits knowledge that Steunenberg was to be murdered.

Denver, Col.—Sherman Bell says Orchard's story false that he tried to "get" Bell in July and August, 1905.

Cripple Creek, Col.—Mrs. Ida Tony Orchard, bigamous wife of the murderer, will go to Boise to testify that Orchard was a Pinkerton agent when she married him, and his house was never searched by the militia.
