**WOODMEN HOLD MEMORIAL SERVICES**

MEETING HELD SUNDAY IN NEW LODGE HALL, OLD PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH BUILDING

No Monuments Unveiled, As No Member Was Buried Here During Past Year—Rev. H. N. Mount Delivers Annual Address—Work of Remodeling Church for Hall Began This Morning.

Yesterday was memorial Sunday throughout the country for members of the Woodmen of the World and Women of Woodcraft. Graves of departed neighbors were decorated with flowers and impressive ritualistic services read at the unveiling of monuments erected during the past year. Memorial Sunday falls on the Sunday nearest the date of the anniversary of the organization, June 6.

None of the members of the local camp of Woodmen was buried here during the past year, the only member dying in that time being buried at Harrisburg, and in consequence no unveiling services were held, but services were conducted in the new hall, the old Presbyterian church building, and the program as published in Saturday's Guard was carried out in its entirety.

The attendance was large. After prayer by Rev. Geo. E. McDonald and two or three musical numbers, R. McMurphy delivered the opening address and a beautifully rendered solo by Miss Gilbert, Rev. H. N. Mount was introduced as the speaker of the occasion. His address was replete with good thought and was eloquent.

Besides the members of the camp and circle there was a large attendance of outsiders, who appreciated the services thoroughly.

**Remodeling Building.**  
The work of remodeling the church building to suit the needs of the lodge was commenced this morning. The lower floor, which was used as a Sunday school room by the church, will be converted into a banquet room and kitchen, and sewer connections, a range and other conveniences will be installed. The seats on the upper floor will all be removed, and replaced by chairs around the sides of the hall in regulation lodge fashion. Ample rooms and property rooms will be built, and when the work is completed the Woodmen will have one of the finest lodge halls in the state.

**GENERAL BOOTH REACHED SEATTLE ON SATURDAY**

Seattle, June 10.—General William Booth, of the Salvation Army, arrived in Seattle Saturday on the steamship Minnesota from the Orient.

"My trip through Japan confirms what I have always said about human nature when you reach the proper point, the heart of man being the same in any nation and under any skin," he said this morning. "My trip through Japan was one continuing triumph," he continued. During his stay in Tokio he was dined by

the famous general, Oyama, and General Noel, hero of Port Arthur, and was received in the private office of the minister.

"In Yokohama and Tokio and other places the army has organized the Japanese Young Woman's Protection League, the purpose of which will be to stop the traffic in white slaves. A determined effort will be made to prevent such horrible traffic, and the government will co-operate with us."

"Tears with the Japanese," he said, "are considered an evidence of cowardice, but thousands rushed to us in the penitent form, groaning

and weeping and giving evidence that they were deeply moved spiritually. "I cannot account for the Japanese attitude toward Christianity and the United States," continued General Booth, "unless God has chosen that field at last for conquest."

General Booth was met at the boat by his daughter, Commander Eva Booth, who has been on a tour of this country. The party will leave for Quebec, where the general is booked for a lecture. He will return to Seattle in October for a series of lectures.

**FIVE CAR LOADS RAILS ARRIVE HERE**

FOR EUGENE STREET RAILWAY. WORK WILL BEGIN AT ONCE ON LINE

Rain Interferes With Beginning of Paving Operations—Electric Light Poles on Willamette Street Being Moved to Be Ready for Laying Pavement, Which Will Begin at Once

Five carloads of steel rails for the street railway line arrived in Eugene from the East this morning and will at once be unloaded. The work of constructing the line will begin at once and rushed to completion, as the company has only a short time to finish the line in order to comply with the provisions of the franchise. The work would doubtless have commenced this morning, as expected last week, had the paving people been ready to begin their work. The rain interfered with the beginning of operations, but just as soon as clear weather comes again Willamette street will be the scene of great activity. Both companies will put on as many men as they can, and from the time of the beginning of the work things will hum.

The rails which arrived here this morning weigh sixty pounds to the yard, and are twice as large as those which arrived a week or two ago and which were loaded on the car again and have been in the depot yards here since.

**Moving Light Poles.**  
The Willamette Valley Company this morning put a force of men to work moving the electric light poles on Willamette street. They are being moved a foot further in so they will not be in the street as it is almost impossible to pave around them. They will be about a foot and a half inside the curb line.
