the governor and other representatives of Georgia I desire from my heart to thank all her citizens. Georgia's history is unique, for she alone among the original thirteen colonies, and the subsequent new states added thereto, was founded with a consciously benevolent purpose, with the deliberate intent to benefit mankind by upbuilding a commonwealth along carefully planned lines of social, political and religious liberty and justice. Oglethorpe, the founder of Georgia, was a true apostle of philanthropy and of equality of

ing to the ideals and standards that it has kept in mind in ordinary days and according to the way in which it has practically trained itself to realize these ideals and come up to these standards. We must insist upon justice and fair dealing as between man and man. We must strive each of us to treat his fellow with an eye single to what his conduct warrants. We must work hard and hone ourselves cheerfully and valiantly."

**Speech on Taxation.**  
Following his speech he reviewed a military and naval parade, and this afternoon he delivered his second speech. This was before the National Editorial Association. In this address the president advocated a progressive inheritance tax; modeled after the French system. Almost his entire address was devoted to the question of taxation, and he also advocated an income tax, saying:

"A graduated income tax of the proper type would be a desirable permanent feature of federal taxation. I still hope that one may be devised which the supreme court will declare constitutional."

It was occupied. Orchard, however, insisted that it was the plan to blow up the non-union men, but because of the friendship of Sherman Parker toward one of the trainmen, who had previously testified in Parker's behalf, the charge was exploded before the train arrived.

In answer to a question Orchard said he never gave a thought as to how many men would be killed by the explosion. Orchard also stated that neither Moyer, Haywood nor Pettibone had anything to do with the planning if the outrages, further than to instruct Orchard to "go ahead and cut things loose."

Richardson, after taking up the matter of the pay Orchard was to receive, and going into minor matters connected with Orchard's life after the independence explosion, jumped back to Orchard's early history. He forced the confession from the witness that he had burned his cheese factory in Canada to get the insurance money, and that his first crime was "weighing up cheese short."

**Bradley Murder.**  
Orchard testified that the murder of Fred Bradley was discussed on a Sunday afternoon in July, 1904, at a conference between Haywood, Pettibone and Orchard in Pettibone's back yard in Denver. Haywood said Orchard should go alone and kill Bradley because he was at the head of the mine owners and was driving the federation out of California.

At the afternoon session Orchard

was taken back over his stay in Wyoming and of his chilling on Pat Moran and sending him to Pettibone for more money. Orchard was positive Moran was the man's name. Moran, according to dispatches from Cheyenne, denies ever having gone on any errand for Orchard.

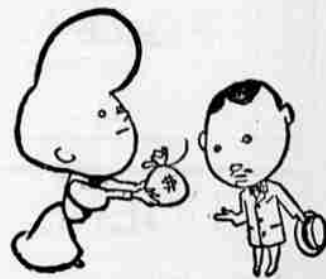

probably be more expensive, as the company could not possibly do a small job as cheaply as the larger ones.

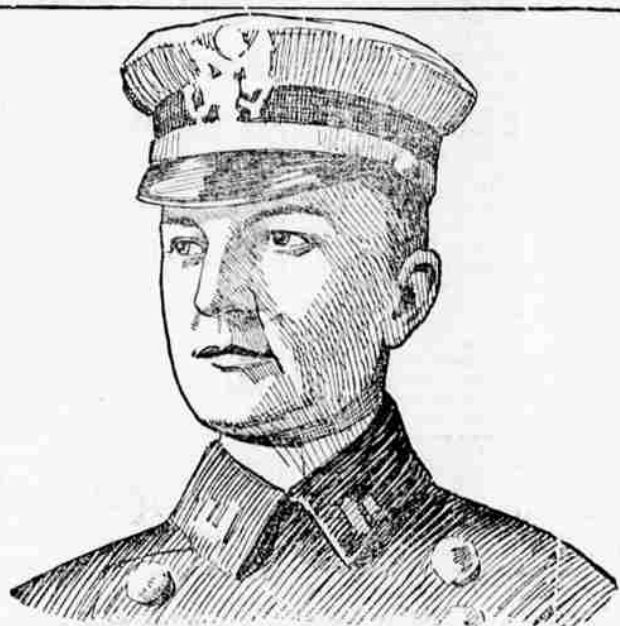

alone among the original thirteen was to found a state the gates of which should be open to the oppressed of every land and creed, and closed to every form of political, religious or industrial bondage or persecution. His colony welcomed alike those who fled from political or social tyranny, and those, whether Christian or Jew, who sought liberty for conscience's sake. It was a high and honorable beginning; and I am proud, indeed, of my Georgian ancestry, and of the fact that my grandfather, Archibald Bullock, was the first governor, or as the title then went, president of the new state, when the continental congress, of which he was also a member, declared that the thirteen states had become a new and independent nation. Since then Georgia has grown at a rate even more astounding than the rate of growth of the nation as a whole her sons have stood high in every field of activity, intellectual or physical, and rapid though her progress has been in the past, it bids fair to become even greater in the wonderful new century which has now fairly opened."

"The navy is our surest guarantee of peace, and if war should ever break out it will be the greatest safeguard for our honor and our interest. As is likewise true of the army, it is manned by a volunteer force; for it must never be forgotten that all our soldiers and sailors, whether regular or not, are volunteers. Every encouragement should be given to our navy, and no public servant should be pardoned for failing to do everything in him to see that we have the best type of ships and of guns, and that the officers and enlisted men are held to the strictest accountability for so practicing with the ships and guns that no navy afloat shall, ship for ship, squadron for squadron, be our superior. If the officers and enlisted men do their duty—and I am thankful to say that in our navy cases where they do not their duty are relatively few in number—they put us all under a deep obligation to them, and we should give them all the reward and encouragement in our power. The higher a man is in the service upon having the best kind of men. We should have a system of promotion either by elimination or by selection, so that mediocre officers could not come to the top."

"The lesson of preparedness does not relate merely to war; it is just as true of the nation as of the individual. Each of us does any given piece of work well or ill, largely according to how he has previously trained himself to do it. The nation, which is but the aggregate of the individuals composing it, will rise or fall to rise in any great crisis accord-

## SELLS SKIN TO SAVE FAMILY.

Wife and Children Starving, Man Makes Desperate Offer.

"Starving family with any work to do for winter. Clothing and shoes wanted. Landlord will put them on the street. I will give my skin and blood before they go homeless. Janitress, 112 East Eighty-eighth street."

His wife having put the foregoing advertisement in the New York Herald, Alois Hoffman, a baker, who lives in the cellar of the flat house at the address given, declares as his last resort that he will sell his skin for grafting purposes and his life fluid for purposes of experiment for money to keep his wife and two children from starving.

Mrs. Hoffman has until recently managed to get her rent, gas and coal free of charge by acting as janitress of the building, while her husband, traveling from one end of the city to the other, has endeavored to earn enough pennies to buy his family their meager daily fare.

Several days ago, however, the owner of the building informed the Hoffmans that they would have to vacate their cellar room because, he alleged, their services as caretakers had been unsatisfactory to the tenants. The family is without a cent. One of the children is twelve years old and the other a baby only fourteen months old.

## FROZEN IN HIS OWN BLOOD.

Rich Hermit Found Murdered in Hut at Mudlake, Mich.

Daniel Heaston, a hermit, was found frozen in his own blood in a small hut near the house where Heaston had been living alone, near Mudlake, Mich. The shocking mutilation of the body and the evidences about the place led to the conclusion that the old man had been brutally tortured to make him reveal the hiding place of his money. Amputated fingers and toes lay scattered about, and the appearance of a heavy rope and of a beam over which it hung, coupled with marks on the victim's neck, indicated that he had been strung up to the rafters for a time. Apparently a blow in the head with a hatchet had finally ended his sufferings.

It is thought that the murderers secured the booty they sought, as no money was found in the place. Heaston inherited a considerable fortune several years ago and had recently been displaying and spending his money quite freely.
