HARD CUBAN PROBLEMS

There are two especially vital questions in Cuba today. The first is whether it is possible for the Cubans themselves to maintain anything approaching a stable and effective government without the direct help, military support and political guidance of the United States. The second is that if Cuba be adjudged incapable of secure and successful self-government, should the intervention of the United States take the form of a protectorate or of definite and unqualified annexation?

Nothing seems clearer to any observer of Cuban affairs and conditions than the fact that the Cubans today are absolutely incapable of efficient self-government, says Robert Howard Russell in the June number of the Metropolitan Magazine. When the United States handed over the reins of government to the republic under President Palma it delivered a country freed and unshackled from its centuries of abuse, its cities swept and garnished, its plague spots obliterated, its streets and high roads amplified and improved, its credit established and its treasury replete.

What has happened since? No further improvements have been attempted, the treasury has been sacked of sixty millions of dollars by fraudulent war claims bought up by political speculators, the country has been plunged into debt and its future credit involved.

HELP BEAUTIFY THE PARK

Next Thursday has been set apart for doing volunteer work in the new Hendricks' Park. The park board has done as much work as the state of their funds will permit, having fenced the grounds, built a good road through them and had bored an excellent well that will furnish an abundant supply of water. Now they ask the people to donate sufficient work to clear the underbrush from several acres, which will put the park in condition for public use. There should be a good turnout Thursday and all should go prepared to put in one day of hard work with the feeling that they are working for their own interests, since Hendricks' Park belongs to all the people of Eugene, and the more attractive it is made the more valuable it will be as an asset of the city. Chairman Wilkins and his associates on the board are taking a most commendable interest in their work and our people owe them their earnest co-operation and assistance, so that by the time the electric road is completed through Fairmount this summer the park will offer attractions that will make it a favorite resort for pleasure and recreation.

HURD PLAYED UNDER HIS TRUE NAME

Roseburg Correspondent to Telegram Charges That University of Oregon Pitcher Played for Colts Under False Cognomen.

A Roseburg correspondent in his account of the baseball game in that city Sunday between the Eugene Colts and the Roseburg Models, in the Portland Telegram, writes as follows: "The Colts' pitcher was on the score cards, and was announced by the umpire as Mr. Lee. The Models declare he was none other than Hurd, the University of Oregon pitcher."

The Telegram comments as follows:

"If Hurd played at Roseburg under an assumed name, as is asserted above, he is ineligible to take part in any more athletics at the University of Oregon. The university has joined the Amateur Athletic Union, and one of the rulings of that organization is that an athlete who competes under an assumed name is a professional."

Hurd's name was on the score book, as noticed in the score as given in yesterday's Guard. His first name is Lee, and the umpire made the announcement that "Mr. Lee" was to pitch for Eugene, having heard his team mates call him by his first name. It was nothing but a misunderstanding and it is likely that no action will be taken against Hurd for professionalism.

THE AUTHOR OF "FETTERS UNLOOSED."

A number of gentlemen were sitting around a table in a New York club composed of publishers, printers and authors. I mention them in the order of their importance as the practical world considers them. The publisher is the most important since he requires the most money in his business, though the printer is not usually far behind him. There were more of both these classes in the club mentioned than of authors, few of whom had money to pay the dues.

But this is digression. The party were discussing a new book that had just been published by a firm, one of the junior members of which was present, "Fetters Unloosed." It had met with instant success. The author's name was not given, the nom de plume being Emery Periwinkle. Call it one of those gilded pills the world—that world which reads sensational novels—loves to swallow. It gave an excuse for what many people desired, but refrained from doing, and some do with more or less resistance. It would have been well enough except that its principles if carried into effect would break up perhaps one family in every three or five.

"Come, Stanton," said one of the men present to the publisher; "tell us who Emery Periwinkle is."

"Couldn't possibly. It would be a betrayal of confidence."

"At least tell us if the author of 'Fetters Unloosed' is man or woman."

"Couldn't do that, either."

"No woman would ever have taken that view of the subject," said one of the party.

"Why not?"

"She would need to have been corrupted by a bad world, and my experience is that only women who wish to be corrupted are corrupted."

"I don't think much of that argument," said another, "but it is not needed. Everything in the book is from a man's standpoint."

"I'll tell you what I'll do," said Stanton. "I'll make a pool. There are four of you. I'll put in \$5 for each of you. Then I'll give a supper to twenty people, the author of 'Fetters Unloosed' to be among the number. You shall throw dice for choice. The one throwing the highest number may pick out five persons, each man in succession thus picking out five. Whoever has included the author in his number wins the pool."

"Where do you come in?"

"Oh, we'll make the number of guests twenty-one. This leaves one unchosen. I'll take the one left out."

Stanton could well afford the treat, and the others were much pleased to accept it. A few days later each one of the four received an invitation to a supper party at Stanton's house to take place at 11 o'clock, after the theater were out. They found there eleven men and ten women. Some of the men and some of the women were known to be authors, some ambitious to be authors and some not known at all as aspirants for literary honors. They were as different from one another as could possibly be. Some were self-conscious, some modest, and there were some who did not seem sufficiently gifted in ideas for ordinary use, let alone writing a book. There were two men with a sensual look about them, one woman who appeared a trifle loud and a girl of nineteen who blushed if any one spoke to her.

During the supper—the order of choice had been decided before it began—each of the four members of the pool selected five of the guests. The loud woman and one of the sensual men were taken up in the first choice. The other sensual man and a member of the Woman's Press club were in the next lot. The man having third choice picked all the rest who looked as if by any possibility they could write a book. The fourth man was obliged to take what was left, none of whom gave the slightest appearance of being a winner. The girl who blushed, not having been chosen, fell to Stanton.

The party was too incongruous to keep long together, and when it broke up the four pool members remained behind. Stanton called on the man who had first chosen to name the winner from his number. He named first the loud woman, then four others in succession, but Stanton shook his head at every one. Second choice then made his guesses and failed. The guessing now came to be exciting. When third choice failed to name the author, all were struck with wonder, and when fourth choice failed every man accused Stanton of having gone back on his agreement.

"Not at all, gentlemen," he said softly. "There still remains one person not named."

"What! That stupid looking child not yet fit to be out of the nursery who fell to you? She doesn't count."

"Every one in the party counts. I agreed that the author should be present at the supper, and I have kept my agreement. People blame us publishers because we can't tell the big winning novels before the public pronounces on them. I gave you gentlemen all the chances, taking the last, that none of you wanted, and I won. The author of 'Fetters Unloosed' is Miss Susan Brock. It's my opinion she hasn't the slightest idea of the accepted meaning of her work—just as one may perpetrate a witlessness without being conscious of having said anything remarkable. The title to her novel when she handed it in for examination was not at all descriptive of the subject matter. On the contrary, it indicated an innocent intention.
