FURNITURE TRUST HAS BEEN SMASHED

The furniture trust is bursted. In a set of resolutions passed by the Northwest Furniture Exchange, the members agreed to dissolve and terminate their relationship, and to that effect sixteen wholesalers and manufacturers, together with four retailers, appeared before Judge Wolverson in the United States district court this morning, pleaded guilty and were fined \$25 and costs.

This is considered a great victory for the government, because it is believed that the wedge has been inserted that will make all of the defendants capitulate and enter pleas of guilty. Immediately after court a rumor was spread that the Oregon Retail Furniture Dealers' Association, the state association of retailers, had dissolved. This report could not be verified, but those who are on the inside say that such action will be taken either formally or by a general exodus of the members from the association.—Oregon Journal.

of dull questioning in the fourth day of the cross-examination of Harry Orchard and you begin to feel that the defense would have been better advised to pass him up without a single interrogation and then leave the corroboration of his testimony to the prosecution. As it stood originally only the story of an informer. He had admitted himself an assassin, an incendiary, a traitor to the land that fed him.

Under English legal practice, and under the practice of the ancient and honorable state of Massachusetts, too, how many of the statements Orchard made in the first instance to Mr. Hawley would have been ruled out as inadmissible? Many of them were incapable of independent corroboration, or independent refutation, and were therefore under the courts of England and Massachusetts, not "legal evidence," but Western practice, and even New York practice, would admit such statements, and they were admitted here. In any case they were not very important.

Believes His Own Story.

The vital parts of Orchard's statements were those detailing his alleged engagements by Moyer, Pettibone and Haywood, or either of them, to commit certain sundry murders. Now, taking those statements, Orchard may or may not have been stating demonstrable facts, but there is no doubt that in making them he believed them to be absolutely true.

Whatever Orchard is doing he is not consciously lying. He believes what he is saying. He believes that he has sinned so grievously against mankind and against the Lord Jesus Christ who died for sinners that he must make public confession of his sins before he seeks absolution of Almighty God. He asks and looks for no forgiveness from man.

The morning of his first appearance in court he said to a man who has been close to him for a year:

"I am going to tell the truth. I am not going to spare myself, and when the case is through I am done with the world."

The long, tedious cross-examination of Richardson has been valueless. He has traversed every question asked by Hawley and every answer made by Orchard with painful minuteness.

He has in several instances strengthened the case for the prosecution by confirming the friendly relations existing between Orchard, Haywood, Moyer and Pettibone. He has left openings for the prosecution to submit matters in examination that would not otherwise have been possible. He has elicited that this assassin once committed bigamy and "sometimes told a lie." But he has not shifted Orchard's testimony an inch from its original foundation.

IDEAL CONDITIONS

IS MRS. EDDY

Boston, Mass., June 10.—The most recent light thrown upon the mental condition of Mrs. Mary Baker G. Eddy, upon which question a hearing is to be held tomorrow in the superior court at Concord, N. H., comes from an interview had with her Saturday by Arthur Brisbane, the newspaper and magazine writer. Mr. Brisbane tonight outlined his observations while with Mrs. Eddy as follows:

"I visited Mrs. Eddy as the representative of the Cosmopolitan Magazine. I had a long and extremely interesting talk with her. The conditions of Mrs. Eddy's home at Concord are, briefly, as follows: Those about her are devoted to her. She is in absolute control of her own movements and mistress of her entire household, that is evident. Mrs. Eddy is thoroughly competent to take care of herself and of her business.

"The suggestion that she should be deprived of her personal liberty, or of the property that she has earned, is preposterous and absurd for a woman of her age—she is 56 years old—her mental vigor and clearness of thought is most unusual. I had every opportunity of convincing myself thoroughly as to her mental and physical condition. She talks clearly—logically. She reads beautifully, with a voice very musical and of great power. She understands business matters thoroughly. She speaks with intense feeling and gratitude of her friends and their devotion. To accuse these friends of conspiracy against her welfare is, in my opinion, disgraceful.

"I shall say at length in the Cosmopolitan what I feel most deeply, namely, that if Mrs. Eddy in her old age should be deprived of her fortune by law, of the right to dispose of it, or of the right to dispose of herself, the act would be outrageous. And it would cause just apprehension in the minds of all women past three score and ten and possessed of property that might arouse the cupidity or the interest of outsiders.

"Mrs. Eddy lives under ideal conditions of comfort, happiness, and contentment. It would be a shameful outrage, and I am convinced that no court will encourage the effort. I shall write you more fully before preparing the article that I have promised.
