EVERYBODY BOOSTS.

Eugene is entering upon a new era
of growth. Permanent street im-
provement and electric railways mean
the passing of the country town and
the beginning of a real city era. Al-
ready the signs of the new life are
apparent, with streets filled with
workmen, surveying and construction
outfits, not only for the local enter-
prises but for the larger work of
building the Natron branch of the
Southern Pacific across the moun-
tains to Klamath Falls and Ontario.
Every day outfits are going forward
from Eugene to the front, this city
being the headquarters for the oper-
ations of the Southern Pacific in the
building of this important line.

In addition to the many enterprises
now under way, there are other im-
portant projects for which our busi-
ness interests are working quietly,
preferring not to use newspaper space
in giving them publicity until they
are virtually assured, and in this
connection it may be said that the
opportunity is at last at hand to se-
cure what Lane county has so long
hoped for—the realization of our
greatest ambition—a railroad to Sius-
law tidewater. The details are not
yet ripe for publication, but this road
is going to be constructed, and work
will be under way this summer. At
that is necessary to carry through
successfully this greatest of all pro-
jects affecting the future of Eugene
and Lane county is for everybody to
help to a reasonable extent, and to
encourage those who have the work
in hand. There must be no knockers,
only boosters, in Eugene during this
eventful, epoch-making year of 1907.

Our people at last have in their own
hands the power to solve for all time
the transportation problem which has
so long been a bar to progress and
an obstacle to the proper develop-
ment of our resources. They should
not and will not fail to take advan-
tage of the means afforded to make
Eugene the commercial and jobbing
center of Western Oregon.

The outlook was never so bright
before as it is now from every point
of view, and this fact should encour-
age every property owner and busi-
ness man to put forth his best ef-
forts; to do his full duty in the mat-
ter of working and bearing the finan-
cial burden that must come at this
juncture of the city's growth. The
supreme effort is being made to carry
out an enterprise that will make all
future enterprises comparatively
easy. The citizen, loyal to the
common good and mindful of his own
interests will display the only motto
that will be tolerated in Eugene at
this time:

"Everybody boosts!"
