PROSPECTS FOR FOOTBALL TEAM NEXT YEAR

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON LOSES BY GRADUATION FOUR OF ITS BEST MEN, BUT THERE IS MUCH GOOD MATERIAL

Hammond, Gillis, Scott, Arnsperger, Pinkham, Mullen, Moores, Kuykendall, Clarke and Zacharias Will Be Back—Plenty of Strong Men on Second Team to Choose From.

Owing to the fact that the University of Oregon loses by graduation this year four of her best football men, next season there will be an extraordinary good chance for new material. While graduation leaves four places empty, there will be room for five or six good men, since last fall one or two places were relatively weak.

That the needed men to fill the holes on last year's championship team will be found seems quite assured. Such men as Taylor, of Portland, Kellogg, of Baker City, McCoy, of The Dalles, and Hildeburn, of Roseburg, stand very good chances of the team under the most strenuous conditions. Besides these there will be plenty of other strong candidates, from all over the state, whose merits are not so well known. Dark horses frequently have made Oregon's best men.

Old Men Will Return.
According to the plans of the old men, all of the other members of the team will return. These are Hammond, Gillis and Scott, who played as guards; Arnsperger, Pinkham and Mullen, tackles; Captain Moores, at end; Kuykendall, who played quarter while Latourrette was laid up, and Clarke and Zacharias, who played at halves. The most prominent men on the second team who will be back are Hathaway, Group, Hawley, Oberhauser, Woods and Voight. "Mike" Walker, an old O. A. C. player of two or three years ago, who has been in the university the last year, will try out, probably for a line position, and "Sharkey" Huston, the fast second baseman of this year's baseball team, will also take a try for quarter or end position. McIntire is another man, who was out of college last fall, and who has had two years' varsity experience.

But for all these men there will be plenty of show for new men to win their "O."

From the present outlook Oregon will need some fast men, especially

in order to keep up the pace she set last year. The new style of playing also calls for fast, clever playing, and men built along these lines are more valuable than ever before.

MILL WILL NOT BE BUILT TILL NEXT YEAR

STOREY-BROCHER CO. POSTPONES BUILDING OPERATIONS BECAUSE OF TRANSPORTATION DIFFICULTIES

Have Faith in Scheme to Build from Eugene to Tidewater On Siuslaw and Are Waiting Until Conditions Are Settled—Will Not Give Up Sawmill Enterprise

The Guard regrets to announce that the building of the big Storey-Brocher sawmill on the Bangs' Park tract northwest of the city has been postponed until next year. Senator I. H. Bingham, who is the local representative of the company, and through whose efforts the company was induced to select Eugene as the site for the plant, informs the Guard that the company came to such a conclusion on Monday of this week. Meanwhile all preliminary arrangements and details necessary for the establishment of such an industry will be gone ahead with, and by the time the building season opens next spring everything will be in complete readiness for the erection of the plant, which will be one of the largest on the coast.

There are several reasons for the postponement of the work of building the mill, one of them being the present unsettled condition of the transportation question with the Southern Pacific Company. Another report is that the company, hearing of the proposed railroad from Eugene to the Siuslaw, and in view of the fact that the prospects are very good for its construction, thus giving the company additional transportation for its logs and lumber, it was thought best to wait till the present plans of the promoters of the enterprise materialize before tying up with the Southern Pacific Company. The Storey-Brocher people have faith in the proposed enterprise and see in it a solution of the transportation problem in Lane county.

The company is not going to give up its sawmill enterprise by any means, as some might think by postponing it for another year. They own a splendid site for the mill and several thousand acres of the finest timber land in the county, and cannot afford to let a matter like poor transportation service discourage them. If conditions are not bettered soon they might take a hand in the railroad business themselves and assist in building the road to tidewater, which enterprise has already been started and which has fair prospects of success.
