CITY NEWS. Weather Prediction. Tonight and Friday, clear and cold. Rev. J. R. N. Bell, of Corvallis, will deliver the oration on the Fourth in Cottage Grove. The Eugene planing mill is preparing some lumber for the salmon hatchery on the lower Siuslaw river. Dr. Scalfie has moved his office fixtures into the office of the Drs. Bartle and will hereafter, as previously announced by the Guard, be associated with Dr. Philip Bartle. In the circuit court this afternoon Morton Douglas, who is charged with burglary, alleged to have been committed at Florence, pleaded not guilty and his trial was set for Monday morning. W. J. Baldwin will open his racket store in the Commercial Club building Saturday. He has a splendid stock of goods and is here to stay. He has an opening announcement in today's Guard. The Warren Construction Company this afternoon started up its rock crusher at the paving plant and from now on it is probable that it will be operated steadily.
