ORDINANCE AGAINST BICYCLES ON SIDEWALKS

The city council met in adjourned session last night and probably the most important matter to come before the meeting was a proposed ordinance to exclude bicycle riders off the sidewalks between May 15 and October 15. A motion to amend to make the time to October 1 was made by Councilman Garrett. It was voted down and another amendment was made changing the time from June 1 to October 1. It was also voted down. On the objection of Councilman Garrett the ordinance was laid over to the next meeting. The proposed ordinance prohibiting the extension of cemeteries without the consent of the council was brought up. Attorney J. M. Williams, in behalf of the Odd Fellows, addressed the council on the subject and stated that it was not in the jurisdiction of the council to handle such matters. After considerable discussion the matter was laid over till the next meeting. An ordinance for the improvement of Cheshire street was passed. An ordinance was passed establishing a grade in the alley between Third and Fourth streets and extending from Madison to Jefferson streets. Also an ordinance for the improvement of same.

HOMESTEADERS MUST FIGHT FOR THE LAND

Contested Entries to Homestead Lands in Linn Are Numerous—12 Cases Set For Hearing.
Lively times are in store for a number of homesteaders in Linn county, and in the last two weeks twelve homestead land contests have been set for hearing by the Roseburg land office officials. All the twelve cases will be heard by County Clerk Miller.
The great rush of settlers to secure homesteads in this county has assumed an even more notable activity of late and the contests now on are the result of sharp competition among prospective homesteaders to secure land which is constantly increasing in value.
Non-residence on the part of the homesteader is alleged in many cases of the complaints filed with the land office by those who wish to oust settlers on lands desired by themselves. Another cause which is brought to bear against the homesteader by the contestant in the effort to secure the land, is where the homesteader is shown to have taken up land more valuable for its timber or stone than for agricultural purposes. In filing on a homestead the applicant is required to swear that the land is more valuable for agricultural

ORATORIAL CONTEST

HERE JUNE 20

The oratorical contest here June 20 between the representatives of the universities of Idaho, Washington and Oregon, will be the last one held here for the period of three years. Each year the place is changed. For instance, next year it will be at Seattle, the following at Idaho, and then back to Eugene.

Out of the five contests held previously, Oregon has won one, Washington winning all the others. In 1902 W. T. Laube, Washington, got the first prize of \$75; in 1903, L. R. Carpenter, Washington, first; 1904, J. W. McMott, Oregon, first; 1905, Morton Nusser, Washington, first; and in 1906 another Washington contestant won the first prize. Oregon has usually taken the second prize, a sum of \$25.

TED COOPER'S FAMOUS TEN-FOOT SMOKING PIPE

University Student Has Pipe With Long Tube of Glass Through Which the Smoke Is Cooled As It Is Drawn From the Bowl.

"Ted" Cooper, a student at the university, has a unique pipe nearly ten feet in length. The bowl is that of any ordinary smoker's pipe, but fastened to it is a long tube of glass. Several of these tubes are attached to each other, making a pipe ten feet long. The particular efficacy of this kind of a refreshment is that the smoke accords through the long stem is altogether a different sensation from that of the ordinary refreshment. Instead of being warm, the smoke by the time it reaches the mouth is absolutely cold. No nicotine can get through the long stem, either.

While Mr. Cooper made the pipe for himself, he says that he will be glad to supply any demand, at four dollars a pipe. In smoking he hangs the pipe out of his window and lets it reach almost to the ground. This manner possesses the additional value of making the smoke colder.
