NICARAGUA FIGHTING FOR UNION OF STATES

Washington, June 14.—What amounts to an actual declaration of war between Nicaragua and Salvador is contained in the reply President Zelaya made to an inquiry from Washington as to his connection with the recent attack on and capture of Ascutia. His answer to the state department was sent by American Consul Olvera at Managua, and is as follows:

"I am officially informed that in accordance with the Central American union plan President Zelaya has despatched munitions of war and troops in aid of General Alfaro, who is the popular Unionist candidate for president of Salvador. President Figueroa is opposed to the union idea."

COTTAGE GROVE MILITIA COMPANY NOW EQUIPPED

Rifle Range Selected and Target Practice Begins—Company Has Received Guns and Other Paraphernalia.

Separate Company E. O. N. G. of Cottage Grove, is getting in good form and its officers do not hesitate in saying that the company now in the second month of its organization, is a match for fully 50 per cent of the companies in the old requirements. The rifle range has been selected across Row River on the Nelson farm about two miles from town. The range is on a level tract of pasture land looking north about a thousand yards. A hill just beyond the targets will receive all the wild bullets. No soldiers ever had a better range. The company will receive all its guns, its service uniforms, blankets, shelter tents and targets. The target frames and ammunition is due to arrive this week. This in store, the company will have this afternoon assemble equipped for service and march to the rifle range, make camp, mount guards and stay till next day. During this scout, it will be dug at the range and rifle practice taken up. There is an unconfirmed rumor that the company is to start July 5 for Seaside, Clatsop county, for its ten days' outing—Western Oregon.

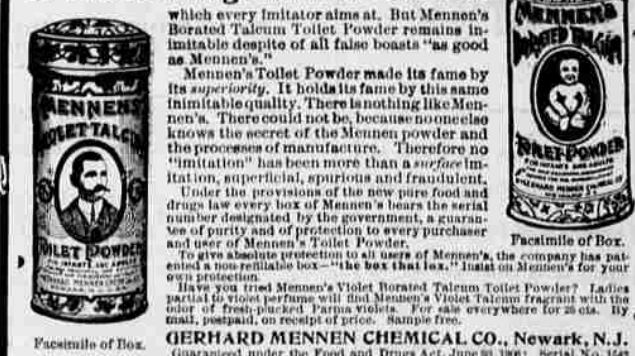
