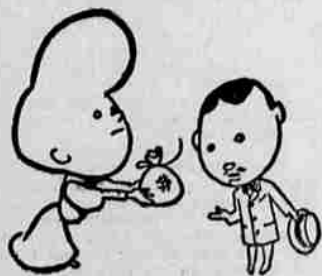

UNIVERSITY GRADUATES 116 STUDENTS

The entire graduating class of the University of Oregon this year will amount to 116 students. Of this number twenty were graduated from the school of medicine and forty from the school of law, both in Portland. Two were graduated from the school of music and fifty-four will graduate from the undergraduate departments here in Eugene. One student also was granted a diploma in the degree of master of arts.

These 116 graduates represent a student body of 600, of which 400 are in Eugene.

Though there are only two persons receiving degrees from the department of music, ninety-seven are taking instruction. The two on whom degrees will be conferred from the musical department are Mrs. May H. Smith and Miss Grace Mount, both of Eugene.

The number of graduates from the university is greater than from any other school in the state and probably in the Northwest. No commercial departments are counted in, either, and even with institutions granting such, the university has nearly twice as many graduates this year than its nearest competitor in the state, the O. A. C.

BRIGHT OUTLOOK OF GOOS BAY ROAD FROM ROSEBURG

Marshfield, June 13.—A meeting of the incorporators of the Douglas & Coos Electric Railway Company was held in this city Wednesday afternoon at the office of Judge Schilbrede, and there were present President L. J. Simpson, of North Bend; E. L. Wheeler, of Myrtle Point; P. L. Phalen, of Bandon, and J. H. Flanagan, of Marshfield. Vice President A. C. Marsters, of Roseburg, was unable to attend.

The matter of stock subscriptions was taken up by the company, and it was resolved to open the books at Myrtle Point, North Bend, Bandon, Coquille, Marshfield and Roseburg, and at each place, excepting Coquille, the books will be placed in the hands of the incorporator of the company who lives there.

The first block of stock in the electric railway company sold on Cook Bay was purchased by L. J. Simpson, of North Bend, for \$10,000.

The next important work will be the securing of franchises and terminals, after which the construction work will shortly commence.

Donald Fitzgerald, of New York, has written the promoters, asking the privilege of financing the road, popular among the people here and as a matter of small difficulty.

SCHOOL DISTRICT TO SELECT BOOKS JULY 8

Superintendent J. H. Ackerman is sending out a circular letter to all the clerks of the district boards of the first class, that is districts where 1000 or more children of school age are enrolled, stating that July 8 is the time set apart for all school boards of the first class to choose supplementary text-books to those already selected by the state board of text-book commissioners. The circular is as follows and is self-explanatory:

"This is to say that the attorney general on June 8, 1907, rendered a decision to the effect that on the second Monday in July, 1907, and on the second day in July every six years thereafter, and at no other time, a board of directors in districts of the first class may, when in their judgment more systematic grading of their schools require it, choose text-books in addition to those authorized by the state; and the result of their choice shall be regularly reported to the state board of education to be by them filed as in the case of other authorized text-books. (Code 3408.)

"In the month of July, in the year 1901, and in the month of July every six years thereafter, and at no other time, the board of directors in any district in which a high school is maintained, shall adopt text-books required to complete any branch of study added by such board of directors to the branches of study specified for a state high school course. Such adoption shall be made viva voce, and a majority of the entire board shall be necessary to a choice of any text-book, and the vote thereon of each member shall be recorded in the minutes of the board. No text-book shall be adopted as herein provided that shall be used, directly or indirectly, as a substitute for any text-book adopted by the state board of text-book commissioners, or that shall, directly or indirectly, replace any such adopted text-book. (Code 3457.) When text-books have been adopted by a board of school directors herein provided, such board of school directors shall, not later than thirty days after the adoption, enter into a written contract, made in triplicate, with each publisher whose book or books shall have been adopted, to maintain at least one depository in such district where such book or books may be purchased; to furnish the same according to the provisions of this act, and the conditions named in the bid. One copy shall be delivered to the state superintendent of public instruction, one to the clerk of such district, and one to the publisher named therein; and the provisions of this act concerning the adoption of text-books by the state board of text-book commissioners shall apply to the adoption of additional text-books by boards of directors, as far as the same may be applicable. (Code 3458.)"
