NO TIME TO ENCOURAGE TRIVIAL DISAGREEMENTS

The Guard devoted very little space to the school election, and refused to print a number of communications in the interest of both candidates. We did this because there is really no issue of importance, and while we regard the modern newspaper as a vehicle of news rather than a conservator of public morals and civic welfare it seems to us that the quasi-public position of a newspaper manager after all entails some responsibilities that should not be shirked. One of these, in a town like Eugene, we think, is to promote harmony as much as possible and discourage factional strife, where no really vital question is up for settlement. The Guard took this stand during the recent city election and thereby eliminated much of the bitterness and acrimony that might have resulted, and in the contest for school director to day it tries to us that if called on to state clearly the issues involved in the election no adherent of either candidate would be able to comply to the satisfaction of an impartial disinterested inquirer. There are always elements of dissatisfaction in school matters, growing generally out of petty jealousies, which make the position of teacher and trustee alike unpleasant, but they are not usually important enough to be worthy of much newspaper space and if dignified to that extent are likely to grow into lasting feuds that injure the schools and impair their efficiency.

What Eugene needs more than anything else at this period of her growth is a pull-together sentiment that will recognize only the common welfare. Larger cities might not be injured by school and municipal row but our interests have already suffered too much from such things, and a spirit of harmony and acquiescence in the plainly expressed will of the majority is what we most stand in need of until certain enterprises are secured and the city is placed on a firm foundation for future growth and greatness.

To promote such a feeling and encourage local pride and loyalty will be the endeavor of the Guard, even though we shall occasionally offend those who are inclined to more radical action.

TAKING NEWSPAPERS FOR THEIR "STORE NEWS"

Last Saturday a gentleman living on one of the rural free delivery routes out of Eugene came in and subscribed for the Daily Guard. There was nothing unusual about this action—it is occurring every day—but this subscriber gave a reason for doing to take the paper that was of interest, as illustrating the modern view of business.

He said that being a stranger and as yet little interested in local news, he wanted the paper chiefly for its advertisements; that his wife especially wished to keep in touch with the special sales and inducements offered by the merchants. They had always taken daily papers and found them valuable for this purpose, as well as interesting on account of the news and general reading matter they contained.

The point is that a daily paper is taken and read as much now for its "store news" as for any other part of its contents. Those business men who recognize this fact are nearly all counting their knowledge of present-day ideas into money, at the expense of those less observing and enterprising who still rely upon billboards and dead walls as a medium of reaching an intelligent reading public.

We notice that some persons in the

Willamette valley are again getting alarmed about the size of the prune crop, remarks the Oregon Agriculturist. This alarm is felt in the districts in which the crop on the trees was poor last year and is large this year. The crop of Oregon as a whole is not as large this year as last, and the output will be limited this year as fast by the evaporator capacity and scarcity of hired help. Fuel is higher this year than last and hired help is even scarcer and more costly. There will be a demand at good prices for all the prunes cured this year.

Don't wait for the soliciting committee to call upon you. Figure out for yourself how much benefit the Siuslaw railroad will be to Lane county, and to what extent you may share in it; then hunt up the committee and put your name down like a little man. There is no other way to show your faith in your home town and you'll feel better satisfied with yourself for having done your duty in the premises.

MUST CUT OUT WEEDS

Non-Compliance Means Fine or Work Done by the City.

Notice is hereby given that all owners, agents and occupiers of lands and lots within the city of Eugene, are required to cut and remove the grass, weeds, thistles and bushes growing in the streets and alleys adjacent to their said lots and lands on or before the 25th day of June, 1907, or be prosecuted under ordinance No. 311 of the city providing for the cutting of such grass, weeds, thistles and bushes. Also to cause all Russian thistles, Canada thistles and Chinese thistles to be cut away from any premises owned or controlled by them as required by Chapter 168 of the laws of Oregon for the year 1907, or be fined not less than \$10 for the first offense, and not less than \$25 for the second, or the city will have the work done at the expense of the property owner and occupiers.
