This was all the run getting there was for Coburg until the sixth inning, when Bettis obtained his second hit, went to second on Jones' sacrifice and came home when Coleman was thrown out at first by Ramp. Things began to look blue for the Blues, for little Sherman, the Pleasant Hill star, had held them down for no runs for five innings. The sixth inning, however, proved to be his Waterloo, for right here in this canto is where the Blues piled up their seven runs. This is the way it happened. Hurd, first up, made a hit and landed on first. He went to second on a fielder's choice by Roberts and to third on Bettis' overthrow to Coleman. Coleman stole second and Hurd came in from third on a neatly placed sacrifice by Smith. Ramp went to first on a fielder's choice, which advanced Roberts some. He then went to second on a wild pitch and Paine obtained a base on balls. Paine stole second and Kestley went to first on an error by Bettis. With the bases full Johnson placed a neat hit between short and third, scoring all three runners after the ball had been heaved all around the diamond by the Coburg infielders. Johnson went to second on the throw in of his hit. Muston struck out and Johnson came in on Coleman's error of Humphrey's ground out. Humphrey came in on Bettis' error of Hurd's grounder.
