REUNION OF RINEHART FAMILY IS BEING HELD

THREE DAYS' MEETING BEING
HELD AT OLD T. D. EDWARDS
PLACE, THREE MILES ABOVE
SPRINGFIELD

Representatives of Various Branches
of Family Present from Four
States—Seventeen Tents on the
Place Shelter Seventy-five Visitors.
All Descendants of Lewiston Rinehart, Lane County Pioneer.

Seven miles from Eugene and three and one-half miles from Springfield on the old T. D. Edwards' place, now owned by J. R. McPherson, a member of the Edwards family, the fifth annual reunion of the Rinehart family was opened this morning and will end Thursday. About seventy-five members were on hand this morning for the opening day, and more will arrive before tonight. However, the attendance, it is expected, will be less than that of the former reunions, since usually a full hundred attend.

The meeting this year is especially notable for the various branches of the family have representatives from Idaho, Washington, Oregon and California, and the meeting is a renewal of the acquaintance for many of those present with the land which the founder of their name and people chose first in 1854 when he crossed the continent with ox-team and prairie schooner from the far distant state of Tennessee. To those who have come hundreds of miles, perhaps a thousand, this week must seem like a visit to the Eden of their fathers for the home of Mr. McPherson seems such a land, with the McKenzie a half mile to the north and the Willamette a less distance to the south. The camp is situated at the McPherson home and consists of seventeen tents.

This morning the relatives were scattered over the place recalling old reminiscences, old pleasures and sorrows, but at noon today they were gathered together for the first time this year. That they came not to the meeting to enjoy "renewals" of old friendships alone is plain from the kitchens. Besides a host of good things a 300-pound beef was strung up to feed the great family, and the managers do not think that will suffice.

No formal program was held today but tonight under the stars and in the moonlight the pioneers and wanderers of the gathering will speak from out of their experience.

Tomorrow the place of meeting will be set for the coming year and the officers elected. On Wednesday will be the festive day of the meeting. On that day, too, all pioneers and friends and neighbors have received special invitations to come with their lunches, and enjoy the reunion with the Rinehart clan. The program for that day is an address of welcome by Rev. R. G. Callison, of Fall Creek, and another talk by F. H. Edwards, of Mayville. A historical sketch of the family has also been prepared, and will probably be read by the present president, H. D. Edwards, of Eugene, while sports, music and impromptu speeches will be in order each day, and the time will be filled with that which is most tender of all human emotions, the sentiment of kinship.

Previous Meetings.
The first meeting of the great clan of Rineharts was first held in Summerville Union county. So successful was the assembly that the following year a second reunion was held in the same place, where there were a great number of the Rinehart folk.

The next year (1905) the annual gathering was held in Portland, on account of the Lewis and Clark fair, last year it was held in Gilliam county, and there the family voted to come back to the chosen land of Lewiston Rinehart, from whom the fam-

ily of over two hundred and forty have sprung.

History of the Family.
Lewiston Rinehart was a Tennesseean, and in 1854 crossed the plains and made his home at the head of Camas Swale, eight miles west of Creswell. In 1879 he moved to Union county, where he lived until he died in 1881, at the hearty old age of 80 years. His wife, Elizabeth, who had shared his joys and sorrows all these years, lived until 1901, when she died at the age of 95 years, and had seen her family pass the two hundred mark.

Thirteen children were born to this pioneer couple, and all but one first settled in Lane county. That one was Polly A. Rotliff, who remained in Iowa. Her branch of the family has no representative at the meeting east of Springfield. Barbara Edwards, Louisa Duncan (no representative at the present reunion), Jane Morton (Jasper), also not represented at the reunion by a member of her family, and Sarah Crum.

The other sons were John Rinehart, G. W. Rinehart, J. H. Rinehart, F. M. Rinehart (not represented at the present meeting), Henry Rinehart, L. B. Rinehart, W. E. Rinehart (whose family also is not represented), J. N. Rinehart; the daughters, Polly A. Rotliff (not represented), Barbara Edwards, Louisa Duncan (no representative at the present reunion), Jane Morton (Jasper), also not represented at the reunion by a member of her family, and Sarah Crum.

These Rinehart gatherings are the most important gatherings of their kind held in the Pacific Northwest, and are a remarkable example of the rapidity of the growth of the human family. In 1854 or soon after Lewiston Rinehart had thirteen children, and they today have as sons and daughters, or grand children (counting those joined to the family by marriage) nearly 250 different individuals. What is still better is the fact that all of this family are of the best folk and bear the reputation of being as honest as the family is big.
