THE MULKEY ROOM

The boom of Fred Mulkey for
United States senator to succeed Sen-
ator Fulton has been launched in
Portland, and an organization formed
called the "City Republican and Ore-
gon Development Club" to further
his interests. The "development"
part of the name evidently means
that it is the purpose of the organ-
ization to develop in course of time a
machine for the control of state polit-
ics. We predict that the effort will
fall, just as several other attempts
to dominate Oregon through a Port-
land ring has failed of late years.
The people of Oregon had enough
machine made officials under the Sis-
mon and Mitchell regimes to last
them for a good many years to come,
and as long as the Republican leaders
insist on such methods Democrats
like Chamberlain and Lane will con-
tinue to be elected to office. After
while it would seem as though the
Republican majority would take the
bit.

As to the next United States sen-
ator, if he is to be a Republican, why
should Mr. Fulton be denied re-elec-
tion? He is a man of good ability
and seems to be working earnestly
to advance the interests of his con-
stituents. Any attempt of the Port-
land politicians to defeat him in the
interest of Mulkey or Calkins would
more than likely end in defeat at
the hands of the voters.

STUDENTS EARN \$10 A DAY.

An exchange has been doing some
figuring lately with the following in-
teresting result:

The average educated man gets
\$1000 a year, says a school review.
He works 40 years, making a total of
\$40,000 in a lifetime. The average
day laborer gets one dollar and a
half per day, three hundred days in
the year, or \$450. In his lifetime he
earns \$18,000.

The value of an education in dol-
lars is the difference between these
two sums, or \$22,000. To acquire
this earning capacity requires twelve
years of school of 180 days each, or a
total of 2160 days.

Divide \$22,000 (value of an educa-
tion) by the number of days re-
quired in getting it, and we find that
each day at school is worth a little
more than \$10 a day to the pupil.

A preacher came at a newspaper
man in this way: You editors do not
tell the truth. If you did you could
not live; your newspapers would be
a failure. The editor replied: You
are right and the minister who will
at all times and under all circum-
stances tell the whole truth about his
members, alive or dead, will not
occupy his pulpit more than one Sun-

sary to leave town in a hurry. The
press and the pulpit go hand in hand
with whitewash brushes and pleasant
words, magnifying little virtues into
big ones. The pulpit, the pen and
the grave stone are the great saint-
making triumvirate. And the great
minister went away looking very
thoughtful while the editor turned to
his work, and told of the unsurpass-
ing beauty of the bride, while in fact
she was as homely as a mud fence.

On June 20 work will be inaugu-
rated on the world's most gigantic
and most costly aqueduct, which is to
reinforce the water supply of New
York City. It is estimated that eight-
teen years will be required to com-
plete it and that it will cost \$161,-
000,000. No estimate has been made
public as to the amount of graft, al-
though it is probable that more than
one has been made.

Mail service from all directions in-
to Eugene is about as bad as it can

the postal authorities as to condi-
tions, and their consequent arbitrary
orders to the postmasters, who might
be able to correct some of the abuses
if allowed to use proper discretion. It
would seem as if something might
be done to improve the service.

MUST CUT OUT WEEDS

Non-Compliance Means Fine or Work
Done by the City.

Notice is hereby given that all
owners, agents and occupiers of lands

grass, weeds, thistles and bushes
growing in the streets and alleys ad-
jacent to their said lots and land-
ing or before the 25th day of June,
