ASSOCIATION DEMANDS LOCAL TRAIN SERVICE

MERCHANTS OF EUGENE BECOMING IMPATIENT AT DELAY OF SOUTHERN PACIFIC COMPANY IN KEEPING ITS PROMISES

Pass Resolutions Demanding Two Trains Each Day Between Eugene and Wendling and One Each Way to Coburg and Natron—If Service Is Not Granted Soon Merchants May Retaliate.

The merchants of Eugene are becoming impatient at the delay of the Southern Pacific Company in establishing the long promised local train service between Eugene and Wendling, and at the meeting last night of the Merchants' Protective Association resolutions demanding the service were unanimously passed. They were forwarded to the company officials today.

The resolution called for two round trip trains between Eugene and Wendling each day and one each from Natron and Coburg, they to connect with the Wendling train at Springfield. A copy of the resolution is not obtainable, but it is said to be couched in no gentle terms, for the people of Eugene are becoming very impatient over the company's delay in keeping its many promises for the betterment of its train service and the improvement of the local depot grounds.

The officials of the company promised the association that they would establish this train service long ago, and now if the promise is not kept very soon a good many of the merchants of the city may retaliate by shipping their goods from the East over some other line. It is up to the company to move in the matter at once if they expect to retain the business of Eugene.
