NOVEL SUGGESTION ON RAILROAD PROBLEM

Every day there seems to be a new idea promulgated for the solution of the vexed railway question. The latest plan is suggested by J. N. Fairthorn, receiver of the Chicago Terminal Transfer Railroad, in a communication to the Railway Journal. He suggests that instead of government employees examining the books the principal officials of the railroads be made officers of the government, as well as of the railroads, taking an oath of obligation to observe the federal laws relating to the railroads.

"Instead of undertaking, by a system of investigation, which, to be effective would have to be persistent and carry with it the expenses incident to the employment of an army of experts, with all that might grow out of such a system," says Mr. Fairthorn, "why not make it a difficult matter for the railroad official to depart from the observance of the law by placing him in a position of violating his sense of honor and self respect, should he so depart?"

Railroad officials are certainly on no lower plane than the average of the business community. Such officers are a part of the business community and the given word of a railroad official is as reliable as that of any other self-respecting citizen. Now why not take advantage of the fact that the railroad official can be depended upon to keep his word and so arrange that to depart from conditions established by law would be a violation of that word? If a law were enacted that required the officials of railroad companies to take upon themselves, when accepting office, an obligation in a formal manner under oath before a federal judge that while holding such office they would do nothing in violation of the statutes governing interstate commerce and if such officials were required, whenever called upon, to testify under oath that since accepting office they had not knowingly violated such statutes—

—I say, with all sincerity, that I believe the problem of rate maintenance would be solved, and that, practically speaking, the rebate and all kindred devices for securing business would disappear. That there would not be a black sheep in the flock is, perhaps, too much to say, but the railroad official that violated his oath would be just as much a black sheep among his colleagues as he would be in the minds of the people.

Mr. Fairthorn's idea of thus making railroad officials take an oath of obligation to the government is something new. There is no doubt that the sacredness of such an obligation and the liability to prosecution for perjury would have a deterrent effect. In any event, Mr. Fairthorn's views are bound to attract considerable attention, especially in the West, where he is best known. He was formerly chairman of the two leading railroad associations of the West and later president of the St. Louis, Peoria and Northern. As receiver of the Chicago Terminal road he comes in contact with officials of roads entering Chicago.

CLEAN SHEEP NEED NOT BE DIPPED

Judge Charles E. Wolverton issued a temporary restraining order this afternoon against the Oregon sheep commission for requiring members of the Wenaha Sheepgrowers' Association of Washington to dip their sheep or from quarantining them after entering the state on their way to the Wenaha forest reserve for summer pasturage.

This is in the nature of a compromise verdict, for Judge Wolverton made the ruling on the showing made in the present cases instituted by the Washington sheepmen and did not rule against the state law requiring dipping and quarantining where a careful inspection would show the sheep infected with disease. In other words, Washington sheep will have to be handled exactly as Oregon sheep.

It is probable that Attorneys Bryson and Cain, of Walla Walla, representing the Washington sheepmen, will move to make the injunction permanent on the ground that an answer was filed to the complaint. The suit will probably be appealed and carried to the supreme court.—Portland Journal.

O. A. C. FOOTBALL SCHEDULE ARRANGED

The O. A. C. football prospects for the coming season are very favorable. A schedule of about eight games has been arranged by Manager Greenhaw, including a Thanksgiving trip to Los Angeles. F. C. Norcross will be in Corvallis by the opening of the term in September, and will take charge of the squad. He will be assisted by others, and the college will have one of the best coaching staffs in the Northwest. A large part of the 1906 team, including Pendergrass, Wolff and Bennett, will be back. The team will be captained by Frank Pendergrass.

S. P. CO. WORKING ON BIG POWER SITE

A party, said to be Southern Pacific surveyors, were in Roseburg Thursday evening, after finishing trail improvement work and making a permanent survey of a power site on the North Umpqua river, filed with on with the federal government in August, 1906, and situated in the Cascade national forest in what is familiarly known as "Cape Hlahee" district, and about 15 miles east of Bill Bradley's cabin, says the Roseburg Review. The particular spot where the water is appropriated is known as Big Fall, where the main stream has a drop of about 700 feet in a couple of miles. The purpose of the appropriation, as stated in the papers on file, is to generate electrical power for general commercial purposes. A canal and flume one and two-thirds miles in length and a power house are among the building plans set forth. No special significance is attached to this appropriation, however, as the Southern Pacific Company, during the past few years, has been filling on power sites in reserves in all parts of the state. We understand they have also made application for permission to build a wagon road through the reserve to the site, which would indicate that they expect to do some construction work on the proposed plant in the near future, but this is uncertain.

MUST CUT OUT WEEDS

Non-Compliance Means Fine or Work Done by the City.
