"JIM" MILLER, BROTHER OF JOAQUIN THE POET

One of the quaintest characters of the Northwest is James Miller, brother of Joaquin Miller, the poet, says the Yakima Republic. The present home of the pioneer is Sunnyside, although he has moved so frequently from one place to another that it would be impossible to refer to any place as his permanent residence. James Miller has reached the age of 71, and the conclusion that it is about time for him to be settling down in life and making a fortune. It is a compliment he pays to this country that after wandering about the states he should choose this place in which to settle.

At the recent Sunnyside barbecue, the aged pioneer claimed much attention from the visitors. Told that he was a brother to the famous Joaquin Miller, several people questioned him regarding his illustrious brother.

"Yes, Joaquin Miller is my brother," he admitted with drawing reluctance, "at least I have all the necessary evidence to prove it. My mother said we were brothers, and as long as she did, it isn't for me to deny the relationship."

From which it may be taken that between James and Joaquin the antipathy has become chronic with old age.

"Joaquin's name ain't Joaquin any more than mine is. He was christened Cincinnatus Heine Miller. He got his nickname while in California. At that time there was a desperado by the name of Joaquin terrorizing the country and some fellows at a shooting gallery called my brother Joaquin after the outlaw, probably

because he didn't look a bit the part. The name stuck, however, and was adopted by him.

It was in 1852 that our family started from its home in Indiana for the West. I can't remember the name of the town we lived in, but the state I know was Indiana. At that time Jo was about 14 and I was two years older.

Jo may amount to something now but at that time he was the laziest fellow that ever crossed the plains. Instead of splitting wood and doing the other duties around camp, he was always getting off by himself and reading. Yes, I've had many a thing to do that Jo ought to have done if he hadn't been so lazy."

The Miller family settled upon their arrival in the west in the Willamette valley, Oregon. Jo left there shortly afterward and migrated to California, settling first in Yreka. Away from his family he began the literary career that has made him among the best known writers of the day.

After a peripatetic life in the northwest, James Miller, the brother, moved finally to Sherman county, Oregon. Last fall he left that place for Sunnyside.

The two brothers have not seen each other for 10 years. If they ever meet it is not at all likely that James will be induced into any very flattering commendation of the writings of Joaquin. In fact, the aged man considers his brother's efforts very poor. He himself does a little writing now and then and it may be that professional jealousy has crept in to spoil the appreciation of his brother.

Rich Shipbuilder of Cleveland Went Hungry While Family Dined Out. "Doing Society"—Cursed by His Daughter For Spitting on the Floor.

"He had to bathe in the laundry while the coachman took a bath in the bathroom upstairs. He visited the basement laundry from one to three times a day for four years and depended upon my care, having no nurse. He told me that it was no use to ask members of his family to stay at home with him, as they would tell him he was 'troubled with the heat'—crazy. He said it was pretty 'tough' to get old and have to stay at home neglected while his family 'did society'. He was left without meals when the family lunched or dined out, except as he could prevail upon me to cook for him. He told me he had been cursed by his daughter because he had inadvertently spit upon the floor.

"Johnson was followed to the basement by his daughter, Miss Hattie Johnson, who called him an 'old fool' in my presence, ordered him upstairs, took him by the shoulder and shoved him away from the laundry door.

"He preferred to go to the hotel when the family had company at dinner rather than stay at home and be scolded."
