WILL SUBMIT AMENDMENT TO PEOPLE

CITY COUNCIL MEETS IN COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE AND DISCUSSES MUNICIPAL WATER WORKS QUESTION

Effort Will Be Made to Amend Charter So That City Can Be Bonded to Raise Money for New Plant. Sprinkling Matter Dropped Entirely—Now Left to Business Men.

After the meeting of the city council last night a meeting of the committee of the whole was held behind closed doors for the purpose of discussing the municipal water works question. While the full proceedings of the meeting are not given to the public, it is known that the proposition of submitting to the people of the city an amendment to the charter so that the city can be bonded to secure money for the new plant was thoroughly discussed. It was hoped by the members of the council that the wording of the amendment could have been agreed upon last night, but there was some difference of opinion and the matter was left over till another meeting to be held in the near future.

The Guard the other day mentioned exclusively that Engineer Miller, of Seattle, who had been employed to look after a suitable source for a water supply, reported that he had selected as the two best places for obtaining the water a small stream running into the McKenzie, near Leaburg, and Fall Creek, just inside the forest reserve. It is said that the council favors the Fall Creek site, as the flow of water is so much greater than at the other and it is as pure and cold as any in the state.

No Sprinkling Ordinance. The matter of a street sprinkling ordinance came up again for discussion and it was voted to drop the matter entirely and to leave it to the business men, as there were many doubts as to the validity of any ordinance along that line, and if one was passed some one would get out an injunction and the matter would not be settled before the rainy season sets in again.

900 Feet Fire Hose Bought. The fire and water committee was instructed to purchase additional fire hose and the order for 900 feet was placed with a Portland firm today. The price is 90 cents a foot.

Street Railway Franchise. The ordinance introduced some time ago for a franchise to the Willamette Valley Company for the construction of the street railway on University avenue south from East Thirteenth street to the Masonic cemetery was passed unanimously. A petition asking for a sidewalk

to be built on the south side of West Tenth street, between Lawrence and Washington, was referred.

Resolution of Thanks. A resolution of thanks to Professor McAlister, Carl McClain and the party of students who assisted them in making the survey to the forest reserve on Fall Creek was passed and ordered published. It is as follows:

Resolved, by the common council of the city of Eugene, that the thanks of the city are hereby extended to Professors E. H. McAlister and Carl McClain and the young men who acted with them for the very efficient work which they did for the city, and the admirable report of the same which they made, in examining certain streams as possible sources of a water supply for the city. The common council values highly the work so done and wishes our people to understand that these services were furnished entirely without charge to the city.

Therefore be it further resolved that this resolution be spread upon our records and published in the daily papers.

PEARCE AND HANDSAKER PLEAD GUILTY

Harold Pearce and Samuel L. Handsaker, the self-confessed robbers of Ulahl Carl at Natron, were brought into court this morning to plead. Handsaker pleaded guilty to the charge of robbery, but Pearce pleaded not guilty for the reason that the charge was to be dismissed and that of larceny from a dwelling substituted. When he was arraigned on that charge he entered a plea of guilty. They will be sentenced Saturday morning at 10 o'clock. The penalty for robbery is from one to fifteen years and that for larceny in a dwelling is from one to five years. The reason that the latter charge was substituted for that of robbery in Pearce's case is that he was the first one that confessed.

Bert Kelsay, charged with larceny, entered a plea of not guilty.

Hoffman vs. Scott. The case of Eugenia Hoffman vs. Duncan Scott, to recover the sum of \$4000 which the plaintiff alleges she gave the defendant to invest for her, came up for trial this forenoon.

Verdict for Plaintiffs. In the case of J. J. Hosker vs. L. M. Hoselton and Leslie Hoselton, to recover money, the jury last evening returned a verdict for the plaintiff in the sum of \$162.50. The jury in the case of Wm. Kyle vs. R. P. Bernhard, to recover money, returned a verdict of \$43.26 in favor of the plaintiff.

STUENENBERG BITTERLY DENOUNCED BY ORGAN

for evidence of the bomb with which Orchard tried to kill him. The veteran jurist testified the first information he received about the bomb came from Orchard's confession, which was shown to him at Denver February 13, 1906, by Detective McFarland.

He at once returned to his home and in the gate discovered the screw eye which Orchard said he placed there. Witness said he examined the ground outside the gate where Orchard had planted the bomb and found a slight depression with the soil packed very hard around it.

Bomb Is Dug Up. The bomb was dug up the next day by General Bulkley Wells, who, using a pocket knife, cut away the soil and raised a mine box containing the bomb. There was a small phial on top of the box and attached to the rubber cork of the phial was a piece of rusted wire.

The bomb and its attachments were at once taken to the office of the Pinkerton Detective Agency and carefully sealed in wrappers and envelopes that were signed by half a dozen witnesses, including Judge Goddard, and afterwards placed in a vault to the door of which five seals, including that of a notary public, were attached.

There they rested until the following May, when, believing the Haywood case was to come to trial, they were removed in the presence of the same witnesses and all save three of the forty sticks of giant powder contained in the bomb exploded.

The explosions occurred in the presence of witnesses at a point in the suburbs of Denver, and the bomb itself, 12 giant caps and two wrappers torn from the sticks, were saved as evidence. Senator Borah produced the several packets and commenting with the phial passed them to Justice Goddard, who broke the seals and identified the articles.

ORCHARD RECEIVED MONEY FROM PETTIBONE

E. M. Stuart, of Baker City, testified that at Silver City, in 1899, he heard Haywood say:

"Stueneberg is a tyrant and a monster and should be exterminated."

The state introduced the original records of the Postal Telegraph Company, showing that while Orchard was in San Francisco in September and October, 1904, engaged in the Bradley crime, money was transferred to him by telegram from Pettibone's store in Denver.
