## IT PAYS TO RAISE

### BOYS—SOMETIMES

Somebody has figured it out that  
the average boy who is dependent  
upon his parents for a livelihood until  
he reaches the age of twenty-one  
years costs them four thousand dol-  
lars. On this basis of calculation a  
brood, for instance, of six boys would  
represent an outlay of twenty-four  
thousand dollars by the time they get  
away from the home roost. The ques-  
tion arises—does it pay to raise boys  
and are there no other crops that  
would prove more profitable?

If a boy turns out to be a cigar-  
ette fiend with a breath like a tur-  
key-buzzard and a laugh that would  
make the untutored donkey feel per-  
fectly at home in his society and  
with an untrammeled and unconquer-  
able desire to avoid work, it is safe  
to say that his parents might have in-  
vested their four thousand dollars  
to better advantage. But if the boy  
grows up to manhood with the les-  
son well learned that wealth and  
success grow only on bushes watered  
by the sweat of one's brow, the pa-  
rents need not begrudge whatever  
they have spent on him, for he will  
be a source of increasing pride and  
joy to their hearts, and when they  
grow old and their hands tremble  
and their legs wobble, and their step  
is slow and faltering they have two  
strong arms to lean on and help them  
over all the rough places that lie in  
their twilight path.

Everything is moving along in a  
way that indicates a real, lasting  
boom in Eugene by next fall. The  
Guard ventures the prediction that  
the towns of Eugene and Springfield  
will have a combined population of  
12,000 people within two years, and  
that they will be built so closely to-  
gether by that time that they will  
get over being jealous of each other's  
prosperity.

The city council has put it up to  
the businessmen and property owners  
to sprinkle the streets in any old way  
they want to. That ought to satisfy  
those who are opposed to modern  
methods of running the city govern-  
ment, and we rather admire the  
grit of the council in giving the kick-  
ers an opportunity to straighten out  
their own tangle.

Of course everybody hopes that the  
government's legal attack on the rail-  
road combine which controls the  
price of anthracite coal will result in  
practical benefit to the consumer, but  
it will be just as well to wait until  
there is an actual reduction in prices  
before doing much hurrahing.

Should the threatened fight in Ala-  
bama prevent former Congressman  
Bankhead from succeeding the late  
Senator Morgan, the primary election  
system of naming party candidates  
will be given a bad black eye. Un-  
less binding the system is farcical.

Judging by the plight of several  
rich Americans who made a bad file  
of an attempt to show the Salva-  
doreans how to pull off a revolution,  
there is at least one line in which  
our spread-eagles cannot claim to  
beat the world.

Now they are hinting that Gover-  
nor Hughes will be supported for  
president by the railroad interests  
because he vetoed the 2-cents-a-mile  
bill. This looks like an underhanded  
attempt to discredit the Hughes  
boom.

The liquor men who are in the toils  
of law for violating the "dry Sunday"  
law in Portland might get a change  
of venue to Lane county.

Bryan supported by Hearst would be  
a sure winner. Safe enough to say,  
as Mack knows that Hearst isn't like-  
ly to change his fixed policy of look-

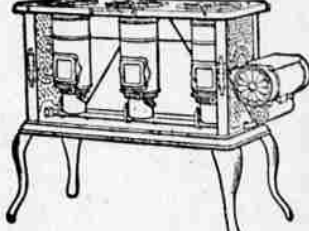

## MUST CUT OUT WEEDS

Non-Compliance Means Fine or Work  
Done by the City.

Notice is hereby given that all  
owners, agents and occupiers of lands  
and lots within the city of Eugene,  
are required to cut and remove the  
grass, weeds, thistles and bushes  
growing in the streets and alleys ad-  
jacent to their said lots and lands  
on or before the 25th day of June,  
1907, or be prosecuted under ordi-  
nance No. 311 of the city providing  
for the cutting of such grass, weeds,  
thistles and bushes. Also to cause  
all Russian thistles, Canada thistles  
and Chinese thistles to be cut away  
from any premises owned or control-  
led by them as required by Chapter  
168 of the laws of Oregon for the  
year 1907, or be fined not less than  
\$10 for the first offense, and not less  
than \$25 for the second, or the city  
will have the work done at the ex-  
pense of the property owner and oc-  
cupiers.
