CITY NEWS.

Weather Prediction.

The notarial commission of E. T. Bushnell, of Eugene, was filed with the county clerk yesterday afternoon.

H. L. Burt, linotype operator at the Guard office, is building a large addition to his residence on West Seventeenth street.

Professor W. C. McKee, formerly principal of the Eugene high school, has accepted the position of principal of the Davis school in Portland for the coming year.

L. B. Russell, recently from Maine, has arrived here and accepted the position of drug clerk at Hull's store. He has been taking a course in chemistry at the O. A. C.

W. H. Alexander, the contractor, who is building the new hospital on College Hill, has reached bed rock in excavating for the basement and there will have to be a lot of blasting done.

S. B. Finnegan, the blacksmith, is installing an up-to-date stock for shoeing wild and vicious horses. The stock has been tried in numerous places and has proven a complete success.

It is getting to be a regular thing for the early morning train to stop here for breakfast. This morning it again arrived at 9 o'clock and the passengers all swarmed over to the Hotel Gross and other nearby eating places.

Miss Leone Kays, of this city, has been chosen by the Portland school board as assistant supervisor of drawing in the public schools of the metropolis, and she will resign her position as teacher in drawing in the Eugene schools.

The foundation for John Hamilton's fine new residence on Charnelton street between West Ninth and West Tenth, is being laid. The work of excavating for C. A. Burden's at the corner of West Seventh and Lawrence streets has commenced.

The residence on James Sanford's farm at High Prairie, above Lowell, was destroyed by fire Wednesday. The fire was caused from a defective stove. Dave Wilhelm occupied the house. He succeeded in getting some of the household goods out.

Dr. Geo. Wall has received a letter from Dr. F. W. Prentiss, written just before he sailed from Quebec for Europe. He expected to arrive at Liverpool yesterday, after a four days' trip across the ocean and two days' trip on the St. Lawrence river.

Peter Carlson, recently from South Dakota, has purchased from C. F. Mitchell the old Thorndike farm of 440 acres on Fern Ridge and will hereafter reside there. The price paid was \$6000 and the deal was made through the Garrett real estate agency.

The work of building the cement sidewalk in front of the Hodes laundry building was begun today, after many delays. Mr. Hodes is having it built twelve feet wide, the first in the city, so that when West Eighth street is paved, some time in the future, the walk will not have to be widened.

They will be white with cardinal trimmings, and across the breast of the shirts will be the name "Eugene." The team will retain the name "Colts," notwithstanding a published report to the contrary. The suits will cost \$110, of which \$104 has been subscribed by the business men of the city.

Wm. Dodd, a member of the Thurston baseball team, while playing against the Rinehart team at the Rinehart reunion above Springfield, yesterday afternoon, suffered a broken leg. He was playing on first base when a member of the Rinehart team slid to the base, striking Dodd with his feet on the ankle, breaking the bone a couple of inches above the foot. Dr. McPherson attended the injury.

A large audience greeted the first appearance in Eugene of the Baraca male quartet at the Baptist church last night. The program was full of interest and each number showed careful training on the part of Professor Glass, who directs the entertainments. The personnel of the quartet is as follows: Oliver B. Needham, first tenor; Lloyd B. Pickard, second tenor; Ira A. Manville, first bass; Claude C. Downing, second bass.

Miss Blanche T. Bigelow, who has occupied for two years an instructorship in English at the University of Oregon, has resigned her position and will next year go to England to take advanced work. She is a graduate of Radcliffe College, Harvard University, and has already done post graduate work at the University of London and Oxford. She is a member of the well-known Bigelow family in New England. This summer she will visit in various cities in the East.
