OREGON ACADEMY
OF SCIENCE WILL
MEET HERE

SCIENTIFIC ORGANIZATION WILL
ASSEMBLE AT UNIVERSITY OF
OREGON THURSDAY, JUNE 27

Members of University Faculty Will
Deliver Interesting Lectures to Sci-
entific Men from Portland and Oth-
er Places—Prof. A. R. Sweetser
Directing Spirit of the Meeting.

The Oregon State Academy of Sci-
ences will hold a meeting here on
Thursday, June 27, the sessions to be
held in the university buildings.
The members of the organization who
are to be present will be largely from
Portland and other college towns. The
meeting here will probably become a
regular annual affair. Meetings are
held usually each month in Portland,
and in the future one meeting will
be held at the Oregon Agricultural
College and one at the University of
Oregon each year.

Professor Sweetser, second vice
president, has charge of the enter-
tainment here. Edmund P. Sheldon,
of Portland, is president.
The morning session will begin at
10 o'clock. Two lectures are on the
program, one by John F. Boyd, an
instructor in the university, and the
other by Professor W. P. Boynton,
head of the department of physics.
The first is entitled "The Structure
and Movements of Protozoa," the sec-
ond, "A Large Electro-Magnet."

At noon lunch will be served by the
members of the faculty of the college,
and for the afternoon the following
program has been prepared: "A Re-
sume of Recent Chemistry," by Pro-
fessor Orrin F. Stafford, head of the
department of chemistry at the uni-
versity; "A Demonstration of Cement
Testing," by a member of the senior
class; "Air Hammer Drills," by Pro-
fessor A. C. Terrell, head of the de-
partment of mining. In the after-
noon at four o'clock a reception will
be tendered the members by Presi-
dent P. L. Campbell.

The purpose of the academy is to
promote research work and to aid in
the development of the natural re-
sources of the state. Some field
work may be done here along sci-
entific lines.

PAVING WORK WILL EMPLOY 75 MEN

Street Work Will Begin in About
Ten Days—Crusher Turns Out
About 125 Yards a Day.

There will be a big demand for la-
borers in Eugene this summer on ac-
count of the construction of the
street railway and the paving work.
The latter will employ 75 men alone.
Of these about fifteen will be kept
busy at the quarry and crusher, and
the rest on the streets. About twenty
teams will also be used.
The crusher has an output of 125
yards a day, but the demand when
the street paving proper begins will
be three times that much. That will

be in about ten days, the exact date
depending upon the progress in the
quarry and at the crusher.
At the present time, though the
quarry is already a big hole in the
ground, it is not large enough to sup-
ply the demands of the crusher. The
rock is very hard and of a good
quality.
