BACCALAUREATE SERVICES AT UNIVERSITY

ATTENDED BY LARGE AUDIENCE IN VILLARD HALL, ESTIMATED BETWEEN 1500 AND 1800 PEOPLE

Dr. Mac H. Wallace, of Detroit, delivered a Powerful Sermon on "Faith in the Spirit"—Music by Orchestra was Splendid—Music Recital This Evening.

The baccalaureate services at the University of Oregon were held yesterday morning in Villard hall before an audience of between 1500 and 1800 people. Besides these hundreds were turned away who could not find standing room. Despite the large audience perfect order reigned, and the sermon by Dr. Mac H. Wallace, of Detroit, Mich., was one of the best heard in Eugene for many a month. The service was chiefly a festival of music. An orchestra of twenty pieces accompanied a chorus of forty voices. The talent in the orchestra was gathered from the best in Eugene, Salem, Portland and Cottage Grove. Mrs. A. S. Berry, of Seattle, Miss Eve Stinson, of Eugene, and Professor Glen were the soloists. Professor Glen has charge of all the music, and acts as director of both chorus and orchestra. The musicians are probably the best that were ever gathered together in this city. The stage of the hall was beautifully decorated with lemon and green flowers and foliage, and the variety colors. The faculty sat upon the stage with the divines who took part, the orchestra and choir to their right off the stage, and the seniors directly in front of the stage from which the sermon was delivered.

The Sermon. The sermon was one of the most eloquent ever delivered before a graduating class of the university. Dr. Mac H. Wallace took as his subject "Faith in the Spirit." He traced the history of faith in the Jewish nation, and graphically brought up the success of our nation as due to the faith of its founders, our ancestors. Then he applied the subject to the individual. By reference, analogy, and wonderful word imagery he pointed out that every great man of the world has worked with faith, that without faith in what he desired he would only have done what had been done before him. Lincoln, he said, was a man of faith.

With faith we must have some object, some eternal truth, for which to work, and toward which to guide our lives. He urged the graduates,

who are to go into life, to get hold of some truth and with faith to work for it. It is that way only that anything great and good has been done. He said that every one should be in love with his profession, and he should have faith that it was a great thing. The youth of today should not scatter his attention over a dozen lines of work, but should aim for one ultimate end. In closing he forcefully pointed out the uselessness of going contrary to the laws of God, physically or morally, for man never breaks the laws of God but himself. He eloquently brought out the old fact, that we reap what we sow, and urged the senior class to remember that great earthly success is not usually the highest.

The features of the program for today are a baseball game between the faculty and alumni and the Seniors on the campus at 2 o'clock, and the annual recital of the School of Music tonight at Villard Hall at 8 p. m.
