Those who journeyed out to Recreation Park yesterday afternoon certainly got their money's worth as far as baseball is concerned, and the home team won, 6 to 5; not because they played better ball than the visitors, for the score shows they didn't, but because baseball luck certainly was with them in the ninth inning, when the garrison finish was made. It was by far the most exciting game that has been played here this season. There was nothing to it but Springfield for eight innings, for they led the home team by a score of 5 to 3. Hurd, who was slated to pitch for the Blues, did not occupy the mound because of his being played under the name of Lee at Roseburg, pending the time of the A. A. U. decision in the matter. Pender, however, who took his place, pitched a splendid game, but the locals bunched their hits on him when they were needed, and thus won the game. DeNeffe struck out seven men, allowed 10 hits, and passed two men to first on balls, while Pender struck out seven men, allowed but 5 hits and passed three men to first. The error column broke even for the teams, each side making but three.

Springfield made all of their runs in the second and third innings. This is how it happened: Kestley, first up in the second inning, went out, Johnson to Edwards; Hathaway, up next, walked and stole second and hit, bringing in Hathaway. Pender then registered a hit, bringing Hathaway in, and himself advanced to second. Kelly then went out, Johnson to Edwards, Pender advanced to third on the play. King then hit safely over short, scoring Pender. He then stole second and came home on McCormick's wild throw of Humphrey's grounder.

In the third inning Smith secured a hit, stole second, was advanced to third and came home while Ramp was being played between first and second. Ramp went to second when Paine struck out and to third while Kestley was being thrown out, DeNeffe to Edwards, and came home on Hathaway's two bagger.

For Eugene Branstetter scored in the fifth inning on a fielder's choice by Hobbs after two men were down. In the sixth Wood registered a run for the Colts also.

In the last half of the ninth inning Pender hit Harper, who went to third on Branstetter's two-bagger. DeNeffe, next up, scored both Harper and Branstetter on his single to right, tying the score. DeNeffe advanced to third when an attempt was made to catch Branstetter at the plate. Hobbs, next up, went out, Ramp to Paine.
