SIXTY THOUSAND DOLLARS WILL BUILD A CITY

The people of Eugene have a very
business like proposition for securing
at least the first 30-mile section of a
railroad to the Siuslaw. If it never
extended further than to the timber
district to the west of the city it
would be well worth the \$60,000 it
will cost; but it is more than likely
to reach tidewater once the start
is made in earnest in that direction.
It seems to us that the property own-
ers are taking little interest in a mat-
ter which so vitally concerns the fu-
ture of the city, and that there is al-
together too little concern manifested
whether or not the proposition is ac-
cepted.

We talk a great deal about Eu-
gene's bright future as a commercial
center, but talk alone will not build
a city. Opportunities such as the
one now presented must be taken ad-
vantage of and in this instance it
would alone be sufficient to insure
the future of Eugene, and make it the
second city in Oregon in point of pop-
ulation and business importance.

And it only requires \$60,000 to
turn the trick!

WATER PROBLEM BEING WORKED OUT

The city council has passed an or-
dinance authorizing the issuance of
\$300,000 bonds for the purpose of
putting in a gravity water system. It
is understood that an ample supply
of pure mountain water may be pro-
cured by the expenditure of \$300,000,
and that the preliminary estimates
have been furnished by a competent
civil engineer. The question will be
placed before the people in due
course of time at a special election
and they will then have an opportu-
nity to definitely express their will.
The mayor and councilmen seem to
be going about this matter in a busi-
nesslike manner, working quietly
but effectively to solve the greatest
problem that confronts the city's fu-
ture. That they will have the earnest
co-operation of every good citizen of
Eugene is certain, and that this city

will in the near future be provided
with a pure and ample supply of wa-
ter for all purposes is reasonably cer-
tain.

An exchange says there is a con-
test for the Democratic presidential
nomination, but neglects to furnish
specifications. What may be no man
can say with knowledge, but what
is doesn't look like a contest to most
of us, unless it be a guessing con-
test, with one man so far in the lead
as to be out of sight of all of the rest.

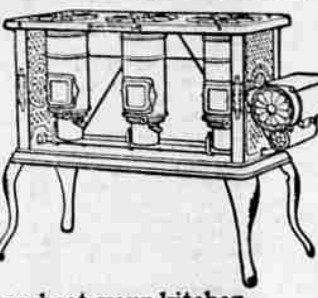

MUST CUT OUT WEEDS Non-Compliance Means Fine or Work Done by the City.

Notice is hereby given that all
owners, agents and occupiers of lands
and lots within the city of Eugene,
are required to cut and remove the
grass, weeds, thistles and bushes
growing in the streets and alleys ad-
jacent to their said lots and lands
on or before the 25th day of June,
1907, or be prosecuted under ordi-
nance No. 311 of the city providing
for the cutting of such grass, weeds,
thistles and bushes. Also to cause
all Russian thistles, Canada thistles
and Chinese thistles to be cut away
from any premises owned or control-
led by them as required by Chapter
168 of the laws of Oregon for the
year 1907, or be fined not less than
\$10 for the first offense, and not less
than \$25 for the second, or the city
will have the work done at the ex-
pense of the property owner and oc-
cupiers.
