CITY COUNCIL PASSES BONDING ORDINANCE

(Continued from Page One.)

and sold at such times as said common council may direct, but not so as to make the aggregate amount thereof exceed three hundred thousand dollars in par value. All water bonds of said city when ever issued shall be deemed concurrent and shall be without priority as to each other. In addition to being a general obligation of said city, they shall be a first and exclusive lien upon all lands, rights or way, easements, water rights, pipe lines, structures and appliances of every kind composing said water system, so as to be secured with money derived from the sale of said water bonds.

None of said bonds, nor of the money derived from the sale thereof, shall be used in purchasing any existing water works or portion thereof, unless the said purchase shall first have been approved by a majority vote of the voters of said city voting thereon at a general or special city election, at which the proposition of such purchase shall have been submitted.

The common council of said city may also issue and sell like negotiable bonds, to be denominated sewer bonds, for the purpose of providing a sewer system for said city, to an amount not exceeding in the aggregate fifty thousand dollars, said sum of fifty thousand dollars to include the sum of twenty-seven thousand dollars par value of such bonds now issued and outstanding. Said sewer bonds shall not be issued or sold until the proposition of their issue, or the part thereof then proposed to be sold, shall have been approved by a majority vote of the voters of the city voting thereon at some general or special election. If prior to January first, 1909, the common council of the city shall not have begun proceedings to secure the water system in this section mentioned, then and in that event said water bonds shall not be issued and sold until the proposition of their issue, or the portion thereof desired to be issued, shall have been approved by a majority vote of the voters voting upon such proposition at some general or special city election.

Section 112. The common council of the city of Eugene shall include in the general annual tax levy a sufficient special levy to meet the interest on all sewer bonds outstanding and to provide a sinking fund sufficient for the payment of the principal thereof at maturity. The money so set aside shall be used for that purpose only, and shall be invested as provided in section 113 of this chapter. The income derived from any water plant owned and operated by the city of Eugene shall be disposed of in the following order and manner:

1. In the payment of the reasonable costs and expenses of operating said plant, including necessary repairs thereon, and collecting its revenues.

2. In the payment of the interest accruing on the outstanding bonds issued to secure such plant.

3. In the making of extensions to and improvements upon said plant.

4. In the accumulation of a sinking fund for the payment of the outstanding bonds issued to secure such plant, the amount to be set aside yearly to equal 2 1/2 per cent of the then outstanding bonds.

5. To the payment of the bonds issued to secure such plant.

The income of such plant and the operation, maintenance, extension and improvement thereof, after said plant shall be so far completed as to be ready for operation, shall be in the hands and control of a commission to be known as the Eugene Water Board, which shall be composed of not less than five freeholders of the city of Eugene, who shall serve without pay, and whose duties, term of office and appointment shall be fixed by the common council of the city by ordinance, at or before the time when said plant is ready for operation. Said Eugene Water Board shall have entire control of all water funds, and the disbursement thereof, and shall so keep the same as to at all times show the true cost of said system, its extension and yearly operation, the amount of outstanding water bonds and current bills and the amount and disposition of the revenues of said system and shall make annual reports to the common council of the same and such other reports as may be called for by the common council of the same.

Section 2. The foregoing proposed amendments to the said charter of the city of Eugene are hereby directed to be placed on file with the recorder of said city, and to be submitted to the voters of said city at a special city election hereby called to be held in said city on the 2d day of September, 1907. Said election shall be held at the usual polling places in each ward of said city and shall be conducted in all things in accordance with the provisions of law applicable thereto.

That the judges of election appointed in March, 1907, to act as such in the several wards of the city are hereby appointed to act as judges at the special election hereby called to be held, viz:

First Ward—S. R. Williams, J. W. Christian, R. R. Mumme.
Second Ward—J. H. Yates, R. McMurphy, W. S. Moon.
Third Ward—Jesse M. Wells, R. S. Bryson, Wm. G. Martin.
Fourth Ward—S. M. Moran, A. N. Striker, A. S. Powers.

Section 3. There being no complete and adequate water or sewer system in existence in the city of Eugene, and this ordinance being necessary for the immediate preservation of the health and safety of the city, it is hereby declared that an emergency exists requiring that this ordinance should have immediate effect, and this ordinance shall take effect upon its approval by the mayor.

Bicycle Ordinance.
The proposed ordinance to prohibit the riding of bicycles on the sidewalks during the summer months was lost by the following vote:

Miscellaneous.
By a vote the salary of Chas. F. Croner, the city's paid fireman, was advanced from \$50 to \$65 per month. Councilman Gilbert was given permission to repair his wooden sidewalk on West Fifth near Willamette. F. E. Dunn and Ed. Howe had made application for corrugated iron buildings in the rear of their business buildings, but they were denied the privilege for the reason that the present ordinance covering such matters would not permit of it.
