JOHN CARMAN.

John Carman was born in England, near London, July 31, 1830. He died in Eugene June 24, 1907, being nearly 77 years of age. Coming to America in early boyhood, settling in northern N. Y., sharing the privations of the pioneer of 75 years ago, he was schooled in labor and industry that developed the most desirable type of American citizenship. Grown to manhood, he married May Lynde, May 31, 1856, who survives him. For fifty years these worthy people with a happy unity of purpose labored for each other, their children, their friends and their country. The love that made them one family had increased fifty fold as the fifty years went by. Soon after their marriage the desire for wider opportunities took them to Missouri. After a few years' sojourn there they again moved to Colorado. They spent many of their years in the gold fields, where liberal reward repaid their labor and industry. In later life with a fair competence they made a home in the fertile fields of Kansas. Later they made their home in Eugene near their daughter, Mrs. J. N. B. Fuller. They have one other daughter, Mrs. Chapman Wharton, of Los Angeles. They are members of the M. E. church.

John Carman's was a well spent life. He was a model husband, a kind father, of the highest ideals of citizenship, liberal with his friends and neighbors, could not countenance an unworthy act, an earnest supporter of the best purposes. Loving hands of the weary watcher have done their utmost to lengthen his stay with them while the gates were ajar.

The funeral was held Tuesday, the services being conducted by Rev. D. H. Trimble, assisted by Rev. O. C. Wright.
