GIVE THE COUNCIL POWER TO GO AHEAD

The question before the people on September 2, when the bond election will be held, is clean-cut. It will decide once for all whether Eugene wishes a pure water system or not, and the voting of the bonds will place in the hands of the council the means with which to work out the problem. They may buy, enlarge and improve the present plant, if its owners will sell at a reasonable price, or they may put in an entirely new system, giving Eugene abundant water direct from the mountains. Without these bonds being voted, the council have no means with which to proceed in any direction. Their hands are bound.

There is no question but 95 per cent of the people in this city desire a permanent solution of the water question. All over the state, the first question asked a Eugene resident is:

"What have you done about the water supply?"

Upon its solution depends to a large extent the future growth of the city.

It is useless at this time to quibble and dodge and raise extraneous issues. There is no issue at all except the main thing: whether the present unsatisfactory conditions are to be made permanent, to act as a clog upon every effort toward civic growth, or whether the people are determined to work out their own salvation, if within their power to accomplish it.

This talk about heavy bonded indebtedness is arrant nonsense. If we pay \$300,000 for city waterworks the people will own them, and the income will pay the interest and provide a sinking fund besides. We all know that the present water plant is paying its private owners interest on more than the \$300,000 that the people are asked to place at the disposal of the city administration for this purpose. The Guard believes that half a million dollars spent in municipal water and lights would be the wisest investment a city like this Eugene could make.

Voting bonds for a new municipal water plant will not increase taxation a dollar or cent a matter of fact it will in due time lighten the burden of the water tax we are all paying now—and that is a heavy tax in every municipality where public utilities are controlled by private corporations.

The point is, keep your eye trained on the main issue; it would be unfortunate, indeed, if the people of Eugene were to allow themselves to be misled on this water question at a time when they have the solution in their own hands.

BUT SMALL INCREASE OF AUTHORIZED BONDS

The proposed bonding proposition does not seem to be fully understood and may be clearly explained as follows:

The city charter of Eugene as it now stands authorizes the issuance of bonds as follows:
Sewer bonds, \$50,000.
Gas bonds, \$75,000.
Light bonds, \$100,000.
Water bonds, \$100,000.
Total amount of bonds authorized, \$325,000 for these purposes by the city charter.
The amendment if adopted by the people would authorize:
Sewer bonds, \$50,000.
Water bonds, \$300,000.
Total \$350,000.
It will be seen that if this amendment is adopted there could be only

\$25,000 more bonds allowed under it than are already authorized under the charter as it now exists.
In obedience to the will of the people the council have taken out of the charter \$175,000 of light and gas bonds, and added \$200,000 of water bonds.

It will readily be seen that the changes made by the proposed amendment in the amount of bonds authorized to be issued is \$25,000 and also in the transferring of the light and gas fund to the water fund.

The Willamette Valley Chautauqua association at Gladstone Park, between Portland and Oregon City, held from July 9th to the 21st, is being looked forward to by the people of that section with great pleasure. The program for the season includes the following famous orators and humorists: Governor Henry A. Buchtel of Colorado, chancellor of the University of Denver; United States Senator Elmer J. Burkett of Nebraska; Dr. Stanley L. Krebs, of Evanston, Ill.; Dr. John Roach Shanton, pastor of the Second Baptist church of Chicago; Hon. Frank Stewart Regan, of the Tenth senatorial district of Illinois; Dr. Frank G. Smith pastor of the Warren Congregational Church of Chicago.

We rise to respectfully protest against Secretary Wilson lending aid and counsel to the meat trust, by banding a ut talk justifying the increase in the prices of meats and adding that he would not be surprised to see them higher. Here's long life and happiness to former Senator Berry, who announces that he will never use the influence he acquired by twenty-four years of service in the Senate as a lobbyist. That ought to jolt a few of the "ex" brigade who not only accept employment as lobbyists but frequently seek it.

Before Congress agrees to the President's proposal to cross off the twenty-odd million dollars due from China, as indemnity for the Boxer mix-up, somebody will be sure to say that it's a steep price to pay for Chink good will.

This trying to satisfy consumers with prices they are being compelled to pay by printing a list of Klondike prices for eatables bears some of the earmarks of a trust agent, and gets nothing for anybody.

MUST CUT OUT WEEDS

Non-Compliance Means Fine or Work Done by the City.

Notice is hereby given that all owners, agents and occupiers of lands and lots within the city of Eugene, are required to cut and remove the grass, weeds, thistles and bushes growing in the streets and alleys adjacent to their said lots and lands on or before the 25th day of June, 1907, or be prosecuted under ordinance No. 311 of the city providing for the cutting of such grass, weeds, thistles and bushes. Also to cause all Russian thistles, Canada thistles and Chinese thistles to be cut away from any premises owned or controlled by them as required by Chapter 168 of the laws of Oregon for the year 1907, or be fined not less than \$10 for the first offense, and not less than \$25 for the second, or the city will have the work done at the expense of the property owner and occupiers.
