LANE COUNTY AROUSED ON RAILROAD QUESTION

Eugene has the opportunity to make a name for herself that will be the accepted synonym for thrift and enterprise. "Railroad day" next Wednesday, should be made such a success that it will be printed in red letters on the local calendar in all the time to come. The people should turn out en masse, business and professional men, wage-earners and tillers of the soil, and while the hand plays and enthusiasm runs amuck, the deed should be done that will strike the shackles from our commercial interests.

What is done next Wednesday should be so emphatic that no person will have the right to sneer at the people of western Oregon as "slow." They must instead speak of the "Oregon spirit," as exemplified by the action of the people of Eugene and Lane county.

This city has made wonderful and substantial progress during the past year by laying the foundation deep and wide for future growth and greatness. It has prepared for electric road building and street paving upon which the preliminary work, preparatory to actual construction, is in its last stages. It has achieved many other things of lesser importance that are necessary in the work of city building. This latest enterprise, greatest of all, will mark the beginning of the new Eugene—the railroad and commercial center of western Oregon. It will stimulate old industries and bring new ones, bring jobbing houses, and expand retail business. Property values will increase rapidly and improvements will come as if by magic.

Better than all else, a railroad to the big timber district, which will surely be extended to tide water, once the first section of thirty miles is assured, will develop the country and increase population. It will make our vast timber resources more accessible and cause increased profits to the farmer and stockman by reason of improved transportation facilities. What helps Eugene and builds a city here spells prosperity for the entire county. It means greater demand for produce and a better market. Lane county will feel the impetus of the new growth from boundary to boundary that will come with the building of an independent railroad to navigable water, owned and controlled by the people—a highway over which may be exported the surplus products of the farms, orchards and mills at reasonable cost to the consumer and not at rates dictated by a Wall street magnate.

On July 3rd our people should subscribe to a new declaration of independence that will mean emancipation from cruel and long-continued oppression. The effect of such action will be far-reaching in its influence, setting an example that other communities will emulate, thus contributing in a large degree to the success of the determined effort that is being made to wrest the Northwest territory from the grasp of railroad monopoly.

When all these things are considered, will there be a single resident of Eugene who will shirk his plain duty and responsibility as a citizen in this matter?

Albany has placed her demand for a new Southern Pacific depot before the railroad commission. How would it do for the state to appropriate money to build new depots for the company in the principal towns of western Oregon? The railroad monopoly is so busy making money that it cannot afford to keep up with the
