TRAIN BARELY ESCAPES A COLLISION

There came near being a serious train collision at the depot this afternoon. BURIED ALIVE.

**French Girl From Her Grave Cries
For Help, Which Comes Too Late.**
A terrible story of a young woman who was buried alive is reported from Paris. She was supposed to have died a few days ago, and a burial permit having been given as usual, she was interred on the following day. The gravedigger, however, left the grave only partially filled, thinking there was no hurry, and three days later an inhabitant of the village, passing by the cemetery, stopped to look at the grave. He was surprised to hear loud knocking, apparently inside the coffin, buried under only a very light layer of ground. He could not at first believe his senses and got down to put his ears to the ground.

Not only did the knocking continue, but he also heard the young woman calling out and moaning. He hurried for assistance and a doctor, and when the coffin was opened the young woman was found alive indeed, as she sat up and tried to speak. But, to their horror, she did not long survive. Every effort was made to help her, but she gave a last gasp, coughed up some blood and sank back in the doctor's arms. This time she was really dead.

EAGLE KIDNAPS CHILD.

Father Rakes Bird and Baby Back to Earth.
A little child belonging to D. M. Riffe, a merchant of Braxton county, W. Va., was nearly carried away by a large bald eagle. The child was playing in the dooryard of his home when the immense bird swooped down, catching the child about the shoulders and waist with its claws. The screams

of the little one attracted its father, who came out of his store just as the bird was raising the child. The child was injured but little, while the parent managed to deal the bird several telling blows with the rake. Despite this it managed to fly to some tall trees near by, where while nursing its injuries it was killed by a rifle ball. The eagle is one of the largest ever seen in that part of the country.

Bounced Through Window.

Bounced in the air by the springs of a bed on which she was playing, two-year-old Florence Engle, daughter of Charles Engle of 1214 North Alder street, Philadelphia, was tossed through a second story window of her home and landed on the sidewalk, twenty feet below. She sustained a fractured skull and other injuries, which may result in her death.
