

TESTIMONY TO SHOW ORCHARD WAS FALSIFYING

Boise, June 29.—The defense in the Haywood case began this morning with a further attack on the testimony of Harry Orchard and then presented testimony to show that Jack Simpkins was cruelly treated in the Idaho bull pen, and that union miners were whipped and driven from Cripple Creek.

Dominick Flynn, who conducted a cigar store in 1899, swore that Orchard was in his store playing poker on the day the Bunker Hill and Sullivan mill was blown up, and Pat McHale, who gave his occupation as that of barkeeper, and said he gambled wherever and whenever he got a chance, swore that he sat in the game with Orchard.

Frank Hough, who testified as to

conditions in the Idaho bull pen and the treatment of Jack Simpkins, Wallace in the fall of 1905 that he had just come from Alaska. This is the first mention in the case by the defense of the supposed visit of Orchard to Alaska.

P. Ramey, a stage driver, testified that he met Orchard on the road between Gem and Wallace three days after the explosion in 1899 and Orchard offered him a 1-16 interest in the Hercules mine for \$400. Ramey said he turned the proposition down upon his memory because of his regret later when the Hercules panned out so rich.

Morris Friedman, a former employee of the Pinkerton agency, who recently published a so-called expose of the Pinkerton methods, was

called to the stand shortly before noon.

Friedman testified that the Pinkertons had employees in the various miners' unions, and some were in positions of authority. He told of the alleged efforts made by Pinkertons through these men to create dissensions in the rank and file. He also testified to having copies of the reports of the Pinkerton detectives, and his testimony was continued until later to give him time to produce them.

Defense next introduced testimony to show that Lyte Gregory was guilty of various acts of thuggery and oppression which incurred the animosity of the miners.

Judge Theron Stephens, former judge at Ouray, Colo., testified regarding the Colorado mining trouble when Peabody declared the district under martial law and deported union miners. Judge Stephens' testimony concerned various injunctions and writs of habeas corpus and the supersession by military rule of the authority of the peace officers.

Stephens was followed by Friedman, who was on the stand when court adjourned at 2:35.

Friedman will be further examined Monday.

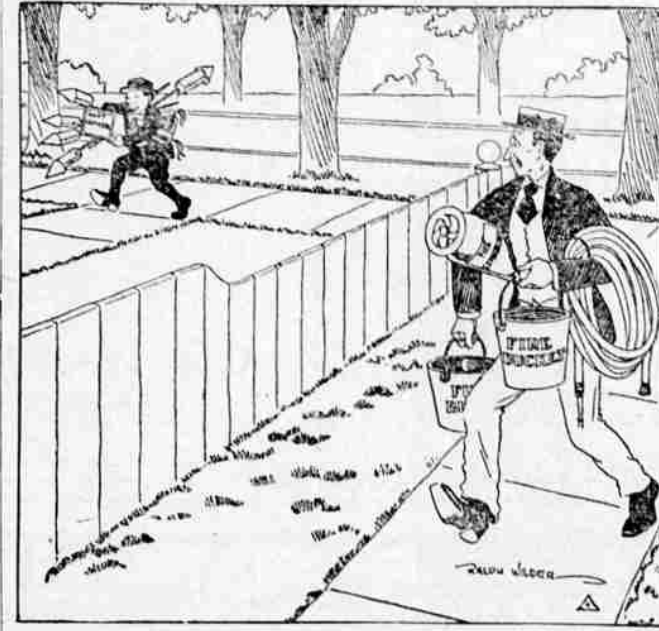

This morning's session was given up to a prayer and song service conducted by Rev. J. M. Morris of the Eugene Divinity college, after which the regular program was dispensed with and the assembly had the pleasure of listening to the ideas and plans of Professor E. C. Knapp, who had journeyed all the way from Ohio to be present at the meetings.

Mr. Knapp was scheduled to be present earlier in the week, but was unavoidably delayed and when he appeared this morning there was a large and enthusiastic crowd present to receive the ideas of the eastern churches as set forth by the eminent lecturer.

There was little work transacted by the association this morning. The committee on resolutions made their report which was unanimously adopted by the delegates.

The resolutions as adopted are as follows:

First. In thanksgiving to Almighty God for the opportunities for service we have before us in the organized Sunday Schools of Oregon and in the local work as represented in reaching the unreached of our state.

JAPANESE APPEAL TO THE COMMERCIAL BODIES OF AMERICA

Tokio, June 29.—At a joint meeting of the five chambers of commerce here it was resolved to address the principal chambers of commerce of America on the matter of the former close relations between the two countries, and also point to the growing number of acts calculated to prejudice the legitimate rights of the Japanese in the United States, and the possibility "that unless they are speedily stopped the ill-feeling which our countrymen are now constrained to harbor toward the people of a single section of America may eventually have an unhappy effect upon the development in commercial relations in the two nations, for while the United States is a good customer of our natural products Japan is also increasing her demands for American goods, and

promises to become one of the most important markets for your ever expanding and prosperous industries."

Chambers of commerce are urged to use their influence to speedily eliminate present causes of discord. A resolution along similar lines was also addressed to President Roosevelt.
