Olberman has influential relatives in the south, and they are endeavoring to secure his pardon.

HOKE SMITH NOW GOVERNOR OF GEORGIA

to submit sworn statements of money spent, its purpose and its source.

The state constitution should be amended, he said, to provide a new standard for the elective franchise suggesting the Alabama law as a model. He referred to the provision of the constitution of the United States which declares the right of the citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or any other state, on account of race, color, or previous condition of servitude.

The state of Georgia, he maintained, has the right to fix a legal standard—the qualifications being required of all without reference to color. The amendment, he suggested, should divide the voters into six classes, as follows:

First. All persons who served in any war of the United States, the

Confederate states or state of Georgia.

Second. Their lawful descendants. Third. All persons of good character who understand the duties of obligations of citizenship, or.

Fourth. Can read and write correctly in English any paragraph of the federal or state constitution.

Fifth. Owners of forty acres of land on which they live; or.

Sixth. Owners of five hundred dollars' worth of taxable property in the state.

"The right to qualify under the third provision," Governor Smith declared, "should expire January 1, 1910, and under the first and second provisions, January 1, 1915. Any person qualifying under the first, second or third provisions, is qualified to vote for life unless he fails to pay his taxes, commits a crime, or does some act subsequently to prevent his voting."

The regulation of party primaries," the speaker said, "should be transferred to state officers, chosen by the legislature or governor."

Discussing the control of railroads, 30th, between the Salem and local error Smith said:

"It is especially important at this time, when many are ready to transfer to the national government all such control, that the state should show its capacity to meet its part of the responsibility."

He advocated increased power for the state railway commission and urged that the courts do not interfere with the commission by restraining orders. "The finding of the railroad commission," he said, "should not be suspended by the ex-parte affidavit of a railroad official."

Control of the liquor traffic by local option and protection of "dry" communities from the "jag trade" was urged.

Continuing the governor said:

"Any plan for the negroes which fails to recognize the difference between the white and black races will fail. The honest student of history knows that the negro had full opportunity for generations to develop before the days of slavery; that the negro race was improved by slavery, and that a majority of the negroes in this state have ceased to improve since slavery. Few have been helped by books. All have been helped who have been taught a trade to work."

"The Negro child should be taught manual labor and how to live. The negro teacher should be selected less by book than by character examination. Racial differences cannot be overcome by misguided philanthropists."

Superiority does not justify cruelty. The man who breaks the law to punish a criminal is himself a criminal. There is no place in Georgia for riots and mobs. It is the duty of the governor to exhaust the power of his office to enforce the law and to prevent lynching, and I shall perform this duty. I recognize the duty of the white man to be absolutely just to the negro."

NEW YORK CROP WILL BE LIGHT

The Cooperstown Farmer, June 14, says: The yards in Otsego county are very irregular. In some the vines already have a fair start, and in others they are very backward. That the crop will be much short of last year is believed by those familiar with the situation. The weather of the past few days has been very favorable, and if it continues the prospects for the crop will improve.

The Oneonta Herald, June 13th, says: Owing probably to a backward season, hop yards are looking badly. The vines have made but little progress; they are uneven and there are many miss-hills, and hills which apparently haven't enough vitality to produce hops this year. Even with the best of weather from now on, there cannot possibly be even an average crop.

The Schenectady Republican, June 13th, says: The weather the past few days has been marked by higher temperatures, and the hop vines are showing some progress. Growers are hoping for its continuance for without it the lightest yield in years will be the result.

The Middleborough News, June 13th, says: In many of the yards throughout this section, hops have been at a standstill. The unseason-

able weather has retarded the growth and owing to frequent rains, many of the yards could not be cultivated. The weather just now is a little warmer, and it is to be expected that the vine will take on more rapid growth. The general belief is that the crop cannot recover fully from the injury received, and the yield must be light.
