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PINKERTON SECRETS ARE READ TO JURY WITHOUT OBJECTIONS

Boise, July 1.—Confidential reports of the miners' strike in Colorado in 1903 and 1904, which were taken from the Pinkerton detective agency by Morris Friedman were read this morning to the jury in the trial of William D. Haywood. The prosecution introduced no objection to a copy of the documents and Attorney Darrow at once began reading to the jury. Friedman identified letters written by detective McParland, but the defense did not offer them in evidence. They declined even to permit the counsel for the state to see them. The first of the detective's reports showed that an operative named A. W. Grattis handled the Federation's relief funds at Globeville during the strike and that Grattis cut down the relief in order to create sentiment against Haywood. Succeeding reports dealt with the Federation convention at Denver in

May and June, 1904, the actions and sentiments of the miners and the proceedings of the union meetings at Victor before the strike of 1903, the progress of the strike at Cripple Creek and the proceedings of the district convention of the United Mine Workers of America in Colorado in 1903.

A number of the letters detailed the meetings of the union which were attended by Pinkerton operatives. Nothing of an inflammatory nature or against law and order developed. One operative reported to his superiors that each miner acted as a committee of one to stop all disputes and disturbances.

Darrow then read two lengthy reports from Operative Londoner, now assistant superintendent in the Denver office. The reports were from Victor, Colo., at the time of the independence depot explosion. Londoner told graphically the intense excite-

ment prevailing in the Cripple Creek district at this time and the threats made against the union.

"I was made a deputy as soon as I showed my face," Londoner wrote,

"and was told to kill any union man or sympathizer who spoke to me." The operative added that at the time of his writing there was strong talk of taking the leaders of the union from the bull pen and hanging them. The citizens demanded the resignation of Sheriff Robertson. He declined. They got a rope and put a noose about his neck. He was given five minutes in which to decide. Robertson looked at the mob and then sat down and wrote his resignation.

"Boys," he said, "I know you have got the drop on me and I know you'll hang me if I don't resign."

Londoner's next report told of a speech made by C. C. Hamlin, secretary of the Mine Owners' association. Hamlin spoke less than five minutes when the firing began.

"There is no doubt that an attempt was made to kill Hamlin," he added, "as one of his bullets grazed his hand."

The soldiers were called out and some were stationed on the house tops. Without a request to surrender they began to fire into the union hall and continued until a white flag was displayed. In the union hall several hundred rifles, three barrels of ammunition and a big supply of provisions was found. Altogether eighteen men were killed at Victor.

For Wilhelmina is a true daughter of the house of Orange. The Queen's mother, the most obedient of parents, has proclaimed this more than once.

She is never forgetful of her own immense importance in Holland. When five years ago she lay on that

sick bed from which it seemed certain she could never rise, Her Majesty's physician in ordinary, feeling the patient's pulse, declared that the crisis was over. "God," murmured the Queen in a faint whisper, "is very merciful to my people."

The story may be invented, but it is said in German dailies it fit Her Majesty's character like a glove. Wilhelmina has exalted notions of her royal authority. She is said to interfere in a most personal way with the conduct of Dutch foreign relations. She looks upon the Dutch colonies as, in some sort, the private appendages of the house of Orange. Her prodigious personal popularity with every class of her subjects saves her from some of the consequences of her unconstitutional tendencies.

MINERS VOTE IN FAVOR OF SOCIALIST PARTY

Denver, July 1.—By a vote of 283 to 64 the convention of Western Federation of Miners adopted a new constitution and by-laws of the federation which in effect pledges all members to socialism. It is announced that the intention of the leaders of the federation is to call a convention at Chicago for the organization of an industrial political

GARBAGE STRIKE MAY BE BROKEN IN NEW YORK

New York, July 1.—Renewed efforts were made today by the street-cleaning department to obtain men with which to break the strike of the garbage cart drivers while the health department is aiding the street cleaning department in removing piles of refuse, the work is slow and the menace of a serious epidemic grows daily. Mayor McClellan believes the strike will be broken today when he has hopes of many of the old team drivers returning to work.

Conditions on the east side are becoming intolerable. Great heaps of garbage and filth fill the streets, making the passage of cars and trucks difficult, with the odor unbearable.

Cool weather has somewhat ameliorated the conditions. A number of small riots occurred today, striking ice wagon drivers attacking the strike breakers. The ice company claim that two hundred wagons, half the number usually employed, are in service today and that the strike is broken.

ROCKEFELLER WILL NOT RESIST SERVICE

Cleveland, July 1.—From an authoritative source it is learned that John D. Rockefeller expects to spend the Fourth of July with his family at Forest Hill. He possibly will arrive tomorrow. A member of his household said it was unnecessary for any process server to search for him as Rockefeller would undoubtedly make his presence known to the officials desiring to serve him with subpoenas.

MARSHAL CANNOT LOCATE ROCKEFELLER

Cleveland, July 1.—United States Marshal Chandler was an early visitor at Forest Hill, the suburban home of John D. Rockefeller. He got no further than the lodge gate, the keeper declaring positively that Rockefeller was not at Forest Hill.

RAILROAD MASS MEETING CREATING MUCH INTEREST

COMMITTEE FEELS ENCOURAGED AND CONFIDENT REQUIRED AMOUNT OF STOCK WILL BE SUBSCRIBED.

People Living in Vicinity of Goldston Raised Seven Thousand Dollars at Meeting Friday—Farmers and Mill Men Along Route of Proposed Line Very Enthusiastic.

The committee of Eugene business men who have charge of the matter of raising the necessary amount of stock to insure the building of the railroad to the Siuslaw country feel very much encouraged and confidently expect that the required amount will be subscribed at the public meeting in this city Wednesday afternoon. The farmers of the county, especially along the route of the proposed line, are taking a great interest in the matter and the prospects are good for a large attendance at meeting from the country.

A public meeting was held last Friday at Anderson's sawmill beyond Goldston, at which the sum of \$7000 was subscribed toward the enterprise. This is much better in proportion than has been done in Eugene and indicates the enthusiasm of the people along the route over the matter. The meeting was attended by F. L. Chambers, F. E. Dunn, A. T. Cockerline, J. M. Shelley and Stephen Carver of this city, besides a large number of farmers and mill men of that section of the county. Mr. Anderson promised to make a trip down Lake Creek and the Siuslaw river in the interest of the project, and it is probable that he has received a number of subscriptions in addition by this time.

It has been suggested that the band be hired for the meeting Wednesday afternoon. A good many of the farmers will be unable to be here on account of the rush of work with their haying, but a large crowd is expected nevertheless. A good many town people who have not yet taken stock in the proposed company have expressed a willingness to do so and will be on hand at the meeting. Others have said they were willing to double their subscriptions if it is necessary and will come prepared for the occasion. There should be a large attendance at the meeting. It will be held in the east park.
