



## CAR SHORTAGE NOT RECEIVED AT COTTAGE GROVE

At the regular monthly of the Western Oregon Lumber Manufacturers' association held last Friday afternoon, a resolution was adopted asking the State Commission to require a daily report of the car distribution. Such a report will settle all questions touching discrimination in the matter of furnishing cars. Another item of business was the passage of a resolution asking the mills of the state to conform their lumber cut to the amount of transportation. The association considers it bad business management to accept orders, as was done last year and not be able to fill them. Mill men find that orders, unless promptly filled are cancelled, especially if the price of lumber declines. If the price advances, orders will be placed a t the advance. It is not good business to pile lumber on the docks. Better cut less and send it away.
