ACCEPTS CALL TO LOCAL CHURCH

Prof. Joseph Schafer, chairman of the pastoral committee of the Congregational church, announces the acceptance by Rev. W. B. Pinkerton of Wahasha, Minn., of a call extended to him to become the pastor of the local church. Mr. Pinkerton will reach Eugene this week and will preach from the Congregational pulpit next Sunday morning.

He comes to Eugene with the prestige of strong recommendations from leading clergymen in both Minnesota and Iowa, and the people of the local church are expecting large results from his pastorate.

Mr. Pinkerton is a man of approximately forty years of age, thoroughly trained in college, university and seminary, and with seven years' experience as a pastor and preacher. He has a family consisting of his wife and two children, a boy of eleven and a girl of eight years.

STEVENS, PIONEER DIES SUDDENLY

Ashley O. Stevens, one of Lane county's best known pioneers, died at his home on East Eleventh street, in Eugene, this forenoon at 10:30 o'clock from heart trouble. His death was sudden, he being up and around the house at the time the summons came. He had been ailing for several years but his condition was not serious. His wife heard him call out in another room and when she reached him he was dying. He was aged nearly 77 years and came to Lane county in 1846. The funeral will be held tomorrow afternoon at 2:30 o'clock with interment in the Masonic cemetery. An extended obituary will be published soon.

On July 3 and 4, Eugene is to have a special attraction in a big vaudeville show, from the Sullivan-Conside circuit, which makes a jump this week from Portland to San Francisco. They will give two performances here and a free outside exhibition on the Fourth.

H. T. Dow, the well known timber cruiser and locator of Eugene, has recently purchased considerable property in St. Johns and think erect a two-story frame building to be used for flats. He has great faith in the future of St. Johns and thinks there is more money to be made in real estate there than in any other Portland suburb.

Rev. D. H. Trimble delivered a patriotic address at the M. E. church Sunday evening. The occasion was the approach of the Fourth of July. His text was from Proverbs 14:34, "Righteousness exalteth a nation, but sin is a reproach to any people." He spoke especially of the cleanliness of the press and complimented the Eugene papers highly in this regard.

At the guardian's sale of the timber land belonging to Robert Hays, insane, this morning, D. E. Yoran secured two quarter sections in Lane county, one for \$2,545 and the other for \$1,925. The third 160 acres situated in Douglas county, was not sold for the reason that bids were not high enough, in the judgment of the guardian, the highest being \$850. The land bought lies in the Salslaw country.
