LOGGERS TAKE THOUSANDS DOLLARS TO PORTLAND

A large number of loggers from the Mohawk country arrived in Eugene last night and a great many more will be down tonight on their way to Portland to celebrate the Fourth of July. Each man has from \$50 to \$200 in cash and they all declare they will spend every cent of it before returning. One bank alone in this city cashed over \$15,000 worth of checks for the loggers yesterday. On account of prohibition in Lane county every bit of this money will be spent in Portland, whereas in former years it was kept in Eugene and surrounding towns. The loggers are all free spenders and create prosperity wherever they do their trading.

ROBERT HAYS

DIED THIS MORNING

Pioneer Resident of Lane County and
For Years a Business Man of Eugene, Expires After a Long Illness.

Robert R. Hays, a pioneer of 1851 and a resident of Eugene since that time, died this morning just as the town clock struck eight, after an illness of a year's duration. He died at his home on Oak street, between East Sixth and Seventh streets, in which he had lived for twenty years. Both his mother and father also died there.

Mr. Hays is survived by one sister, Amanda Hays, of this city, and two brothers, John Hays, of Pendleton, and George Hays, who is in Alaska. He was the youngest of the three.

He was one of the few children to cross the plains, being only three years old when he came to Oregon from his birthplace in Missouri. He was born on October 4, 1848, being at the time of his death nearly sixty

years old. Besides his brothers and sister he is survived by more distant relatives in Portland and Ballard, Washington. He was never married. He was for years engaged in business in Eugene and three years ago began the management of his hop yard at Creswell, continuing until he was incapacitated for work by illness.

About a year ago "Bob," as he was familiarly known, suffered a stroke of paralysis, and on June 21 he received a second stroke from which he slowly sank until his death. Interment will be made in the Odd Fellows' cemetery, probably on Friday.

The funeral will be held at the house, complete arrangements not being completed.

LOCAL POST G. A. R. HONORED AT NEWBERG

J. W. Geary Post G. A. R., of this city was honored by the department encampment held at Newberg last week by having two of its members chosen as department officers for the ensuing year, and as neither of these men sought any position it was a very graceful act of the department to thus honor them. It speaks volumes for the standing of the post as well as for the popularity and efficiency of the men chosen.

Commander Baker was chosen as a member of the council of administration and R. H. Miller as alternate delegate to the national encampment to be held at Saratoga, N. Y., in September next. Both men were elected by unanimous vote of the encampment.

J. W. Geary Post is the third largest in the Department of Oregon and is prospering as never before. The retiring department commander, Hammer Sutcliffe, incorporated in his report to the encampment an article copied from the Eugene papers and written by Commander Baker urging the organization of a Sons of Veterans' camp at Eugene. It was copied verbatim and was adopted unanimously by the encampment, thus placing the Grand Army of the Republic on record as endorsing and encouraging the organization of Sons of Veterans' camps throughout the state.

Capt. Crane of General McKenzie Camp No. 217, of this city, has been commissioned mustering officer for the Division of Oregon with the rank of major. The expectation and hope is that under the fostering care of the Grand Army of the Republic in this department that much activity along the line of organization of camps will soon be apparent and that Oregon will soon be an independent division of the Sons of Veterans. Oregon at the present time is attached to the Division of California and Nevada.
