**REPORT OF
L. OF G. A. R.
CONVENTION**

Eugene, July 2.—To the Editor: On the morning of June 24 the department president, Mrs. Clementine Reiser, the president, Nettie Krouse of Rich Mountain Circle No. 4, L. of G. A. R., Eugene, Department of Oregon, with 12 delegates, and team which were to put on the floor work left Eugene for the seat of the annual convention at Newberg.

Through the valley that is seldom equaled and never surpassed, we sped. Our hearts were light, our eyes were keen, and very little of the landscape within the line of our vision escaped them.
