PORTLAND MARKET REPORT

Portland, Or., July 3.—Two of the leading creameries of the city this morning advanced the price of butter to 27½ cents a pound. The other creamery concerns are holding to 25 cents, the price that has prevailed for two weeks, but the chances are that they will also put the price up within a day or two.

An advance in butter at this time of the year is something unusual, for in other years at this time the market has generally trended downward. From May 31 to July 3 last year butter sold at 21½ cents. Butter is therefore, worth six cents a pound more now than it was a year ago, a factor of importance to the growing dairy interests of Oregon.

An interesting fact this year is that butter is advancing during the season of heaviest cream production. The output at the Valley and Coast creameries is now at the maximum, for the recent rains have stimulated the growth of pasture grass yet the price of the product goes up instead of down. For some time, it is said, supplies of city and country creamery have been short of the demand, and the markets of the East, which largely affect conditions here, are reported firm.

Colorado Potatoes Are Due

A car of Colorado potatoes is due today from Greeley. This is the first car to be sent in this direction the present season. Stocks are said to be in fine shape. Sherk & Graham company, the receivers. Market for both old and new potatoes is firmer. Likewise onions.

Six cars of bananas arrived in yesterday and were unloaded this morning. Quite good shape.

Another car of Brawley cantaloupes due tonight. Were expected this morning but were delayed. Said to be in fine condition. Trade is awaiting arrival because it is almost out of good "cants." Plenty of poor quality going begging.

California tomatoes show a very sharp advance here owing to a similar rise in the south.

Local cabbage is in fine shape and is selling at 3 cents a pound.

Higher prices are named on peaches because of an advance in the south. Club car did not arrive this morning.

Loganberry market is holding steady at \$1.25 for good fruit. Canned will begin in earnest after the Fourth.

Cherry demand good, especially for fancy Blugs. These are selling at 8 cents and 12 cents a pound.

A shipment of gooseberries from Hood River came in fine shape.

Holiday Demand for Chickens

All through the present week a very good demand is expected for chickens on dother poultry. Fourth of July trade is expected to be very heavy this year, and one of the large retailers was around this morning arranging for most of the supplies that are expected during the week. The market is ½c higher.

Egg market is just holding its own. One large firm is selling at 22c and 24c, while some others are charging 25c.

There is no change in the condition of the local livestock market, and Saturday's prices prevail. Receipts today consisted of 78 cattle. Quotations are:
