EUGENE HAS MEN WHO WOULD BENEFIT FROM ENTERPRISE OF OTHERS

There are still a few thousand dollars more of the Sinslaw railroad stock to be taken and the business men and property owners of Eugene who have not subscribed should hesitate no longer. Work can be commenced at once if the subscription list is closed up now, and Mr. Carver is given the word to go ahead.

It seems strange that men of good intelligence have to be urged to take advantage of an opportunity that they have been hoping for so long. Such action can only be construed to mean that some of them hope to shirk their duty, feeling that the amount required will be raised at last and they will receive the benefit of the money invested by those who are more enterprising citizens than themselves. This, to say the least, is a very narrow view to take and stamps a man as anything but a progressive citizen to whom the community may turn with confidence in time of its necessity. When the list of subscribers is published, with the amount each has pledged, there will be less public confidence placed in the men whose names are not there, although some of them are well to do and have made their money here and continue to do business among us.

People will not only read that list carefully, but will preserve it for future reference, because the greatest opportunity in its history is thrust upon Eugene and some men who owe much to the community have spurned the privilege of performing an act that will be of benefit to all alike.

There are a few residents of Eugene who cannot afford to take more than one share of this railroad stock; there are many still holding back who might well afford to subscribe for thousands of dollars worth of it.

Does the Willamette Valley company intend to build the electric line from this city to Springfield? If so, they have done nothing yet to indicate it, having received no steel for that purpose, or made the slightest preparation for bridging the Willamette river, which is the most difficult part of the construction work. After a year of promises it is up to the company to get to work or ship away their few carloads of steel and abandon the field. The people want capitalists to invest their money here but they desire that class who will make good their agreements and keep faith with the public. Most persons have come to regard any statement regarding electric road work given out by the Willamette Valley company in the light of a joke—if they give it any consideration at all.

Judge Galloway has decided that the referendum petitions are invalid, upon the very grounds suggested by the Guard at the time the petitions were filed. He holds the omission of the warning clause to be a fatal defect and therein emphasizes the only safeguard the people have against the operations of these referendum cranks. If a batch of riff raff signatures may be filed with the secretary of state against any act of the legislature, thus clogging the machinery of the state government at the will of a few malcontents, there would be no end to the dangers presented by the legislative system. For that reason not only the friends of the state university but all good citizens have cause to rejoice in the decision made by Judge Galloway.

The Commercial club has taken the initiative in petitioning the

county court to have the streets about the county property paved while the Warren Construction company's plant is here this summer. If this is done it is quite certain that property owners along several other blocks adjacent will petition to come into the paved district, thus considerably increasing its area. The court can make no mistake in consenting to the prayers of the petitioners in this case, since money spent for such permanent improvements is never wasted, but is rather invested to good advantage, bringing splendid returns in course of time.

The Associated Press must have entered the field of romance when it reported the other day that two cars of dynamite were exploded on the Oregon Short Line near Salt Lake. Harry Orchard is supposed to be shut up tight in the penitentiary at Boise.

Shouters against paternalism should be very careful about signing appeals to the president to interfere in some private business controversy, even if they are personally interested. Loeb may keep a list of those signatures, and he has been known to "leak."

The state railroad commission has decided to run the Southern Pacific trains through Oregon on time. This news must be a source of considerable satisfaction to the railroad officials who have been trying to do it so long without success.
