SOLDIERS RUN AMUCK

AT JAMESTOWN FAIR

Norfolk, Va., July 3.—Five hundred soldiers, members of the Second South Carolina and First Kentucky regiments, at the Jamestown exposition, ran amuck there, interfering with the concessionaires and attempting to take possession of several shows on the "War Path," and when the Pohatton guards interfered, a riot followed, several men being injured. Earlier in the night some of the soldiers who had been drinking became disorderly and were repeatedly cautioned by the guards. Later, when their number had been increased to about 300, they threw aside restraint and proceeded to "do the War Path," ignoring the door-keepers, declining

to pay admission fees and refusing to leave the building. After several soldiers had been arrested, they retaliated by hurling rocks at the guards, and a lively riot ensued, until soldiers from the camp reinforced the guards and restored order.

SUNDAY SPECIALIST COMES TO EUGENE NEXT SUNDAY

On invitation of the churches of Eugene Prof. Knapp speaks Sunday, July 7th in Eugene.

Prof. Knapp, one of the most efficient Sunday school specialists in America, will be in Eugene next Sunday. He will speak in all the Sunday schools at their usual hours and will hold a mass meeting for all interested in boys and girls at the Baptist church at 3 p. m. and a union service of all the churches at 8 p. m. in the Christian church. Services in the Baptist, Presbyterian churches, United Brethren, Methodist and probably others will be withdrawn in favor of the union services at 8 p. m. Come.

Prof. Knapp's theme at 3 p. m. is "How to Build up a Sunday School;" at 8 p. m. "The Larger Version of the Sunday School."

Mr. Knapp is a graduate of the University of Michigan, was formerly director of Bible Study in the Broadway Tabernacle, New York City and is at present instructor in Bible School Administration in the Hartford School of Religious Pedagogy and also educational superintendent of the Connecticut Sunday School Association. His address at the Toronto convention on "Building up a City School," told about his work in the Fourth Church Sunday school, Hartford, Conn.

A Sunday School Specialist.

Perhaps no young man in America has had larger opportunities for specializing in Sunday school work than has Mr. Knapp. He may very properly be called an all-around Sunday school man. For several years he was busy in the Michigan work. He will be remembered in Ohio as a member of the Ohio State Tour party in the spring of 1903. His name has appeared as a speaker on four Ohio Sunday convention programs. As superintendent of the Fourth Church Sunday school, Hartford, Conn., and later as director of Bible Study in the Broadway Tabernacle, New York City; as contributor to the columns of the "Church Economist," he has won for himself a name in the Sunday school world. Mr. Knapp has just accepted a chair in the Hartford School of Religious Pedagogy, Hartford, Conn., and will devote a number of years to the training of young people for Sunday school work—Ohio Sunday School Worker, May, 1906.
