EUGENE IS FORTUNATE IN POSSESSING CLASS OF ENTERPRISING CITIZENS

Eugene has been very dilatory in subscribing for \$60,000 worth of stock in the Suislaw railroad proposition. It would seem as if a city of 7,000 people, possessing the wealth that is centered here, should have taken this small amount of stock in twenty-four hours; in fact there are a dozen men who might take it all and it would be the best investment of their lives, considering the amount of their property holdings and the increased values that will result from the building of a new railroad out of Eugene, into the big lumber district in the direction of the coast. But some of these men have not taken a dollar's worth of stock—and therein has the committee fallen down in its calculations. The lack of enterprise on the part of the larger property owners has made it necessary to appeal to the owners of smaller real estate holdings; to the home builders and businessmen, whose enterprise and progressive spirit are their principal assets. These have responded in most instances, nobly—and therein lies the chief aid, it might be said, the only hope of building up a city here in the natural, geographical location for an important commercial centre.

It is, however, a source of much satisfaction to all those who have faith in the future of Eugene to know that we have among us, in the younger class of businessmen, as enterprising a citizenship as can be found in any part of the coast. They have taken hold of this railroad proposition with commendable energy and kept at the work perseveringly in spite of numberless discouragements and rebuffs from those who should have extended encouragement and assistance. The Guard believes that the efforts of these men will be crowned with success, not only in the present instance, but in future enterprises that tend to make for the up-building of the city, and that in promoting the general welfare they will bring deserved prosperity to their individual interests and thus be substantially rewarded.

ONLY FEW THOUSAND MORE WANTED TO INSURE SUISLAW ROAD

Only about \$5,000 more is wanted to complete the amount of stock needed to assure the building of the Suislaw railroad. If a few public-spirited citizens will come to the front at once, this matter can be closed up without further delay, the company can be incorporated, the work of securing the right-of-way and making the permanent survey commenced. By the time the first commencement of rails, now on the way to Portland, reaches here, the preliminaries may be all completed and actual construction work started. It is the intention to complete at least ten miles of the road yet this fall, and it can be done if the stock subscription is closed at once.

Several wealthy property owners have made subscriptions that are so conditioned they are valueless in aiding the project. If these men would now come forward and change their subscriptions to conform with the terms of Mr. Carver's proposition, the necessary amount would be completed and the greatest project ever undertaken by Eugene and Lane county will have been fairly begun.

Gentlemen, it is a call to duty—will you fall to meet the expectations of your fellow citizens?

Does any resident of Eugene want to do his duty in the future that he has failed to do his duty on an occasion that called for united and unselfish effort?

The habit of indulging in the use of profane or obscene language is one of the most nonsensical habits a human being ever acquired. MAY BRING MORE LOGGERS HERE

Some of the loggers up the river fear that the recent abandonment of the camps on Puget Sound and the Columbia will flood the Willamette camps with loggers, which will bring the wages down lower. As perhaps 20,000 men were thrown out of employment, there seems to be plenty of justification for the belief that there may be an overflow of men in the Upper Willamette logging enterprises.

Though, it is said, that these men will not go to work in the harvest fields or do railroad work, it is found to crowd out those who are not un-armed loggers, and will help to fill the ranks of laborers in Lane county.
