Other Witnesses Testify.
C. M. Pratt was next called. After being questioned regarding the dividends of the Standard Oil Co. of New Jersey, Pratt testified that this company owned a large proportion of the stock of the Standard Oil Co. of Indiana and of the Union Tank line. He could not recall the exact amount.

E. M. Stanton, of the car department of the Alton railroad, was called and asked if he could tell what money was paid the Alton by the Standard Oil and Union Tank companies. He said he could not. A long discussion then occurred regarding rates and tariffs, following which Judge Landis asked if the defense desired to introduce any evidence in this case. Counsel at first answered "absolutely nothing," and the court suggested that the defense take every care to see that such evidence as may seem of importance to the defense be submitted, as he desired to extend every facility to the defense. Counsel then said they would take the suggestion under advisement until Monday morning. This ended the investigation.

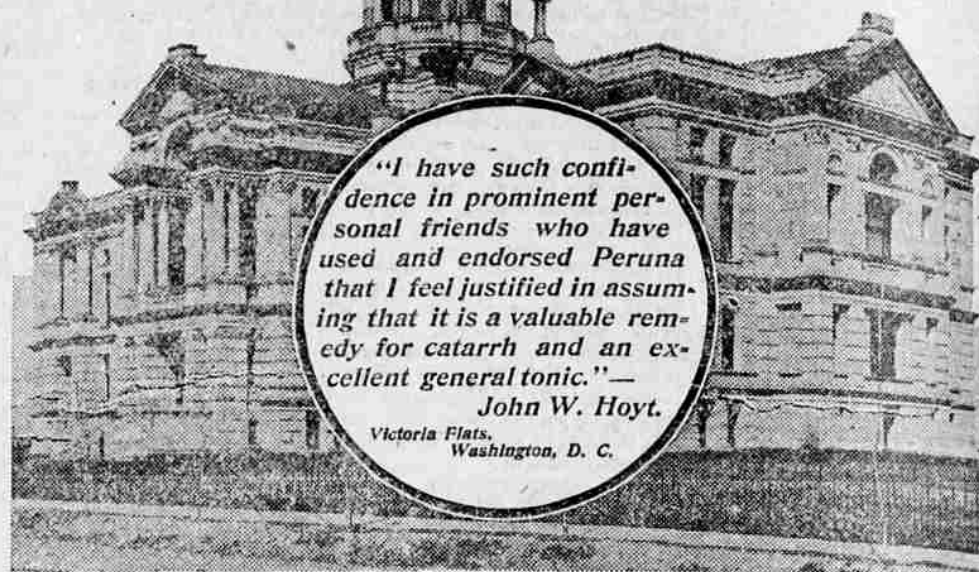
Fine May Be Millions.
Judge Landis said after adjournment that the investigation was concluded so far as he was concerned and the witnesses were discharged.

The case at issue is the government against the Standard Oil Co. of Indiana. After a stubborn trial the oil company was found guilty on 1,462 counts of having received rebates from the Alton. Judge Landis is empowered to fine the defendants count, or a maximum penalty of \$29, from \$1,000 to \$20,000 on each 240,000. The capital stock of the Indiana company is but \$11,000,000 and the supreme court might deem the maximum fine as falling in the class of cruel and unusual punishment prohibited by the constitution. If it is shown, however, that the Indiana company is merely a subsidiary to the New Jersey concern, with capital of \$100,000,000, no such appeal could be made.

Early Monday morning Mr. James P. Robertson, father of Mrs. A. D. Ruddiman, passed away at Springfield after two weeks' sickness with the grippe.

Mr. Robertson was born in Aberdeen, Scotland, August 15, 1835, and at the time of his death was aged 71 years, 10 months and 15 days. He was married at the age of 21 years to Aberdeen to Margaret Hoyt, who died twenty-seven years later. In 1899 he came to America where he resided until 1891, when he returned to Scotland. In 1892 he again returned to this state, settling in Portland, where he has since resided until about a year ago, when he came to Springfield to make his permanent home with his daughter, Mrs. A. D.
