BRADLEY'S AFFIDAVITS CONTRADICT TESTIMONY OF HARRY ORCHARD

Boise, July 10.—The Haywood trial was resumed at 10 o'clock this morning. Depositions made by Frank Bradley, of San Francisco, were called up as evidence and read. Bradley in these swears the explosion at his residence in 1905 was caused by accumulated gas, and not by a dynamite bomb, as Orchard had testified.

The testimony of Bradley was taken by a commission, and was taken in question and answer form. The testimony of several other witnesses, bearing upon the Bradley explosion, was obtained in like manner. All expressed their belief that the explosion was due to gas and not dynamite, as sworn to by Orchard. In the basement of the house there were seven gas meters, and the plumbers found a hole back of one of

the meters. The building was a frame structure and gas escaping in the cellar could rise through the walls to the vestibule, where the explosion occurred.

Bradley sued the gas company and was awarded \$10,000 damages.

The company has appealed the case on the strength of Orchard's testimony.

The Present Program

Following the Bradley matter additional testimony will be introduced to show that before he fled from the Cour d'Alenes in 1899 Orchard attempted to sell the Hercules mine and it will be shown that Simpkins went to Denver in the fall of 1905 after he parted with Orchard in California. CROWD CHEERS WHEN SCHMITZ IS SENT UP FOR FIVE YEARS

San Francisco, July 8.—Mayor Eugene E. Schmitz was today sentenced to five years in the penitentiary for extortion. When sentence was pronounced there was a remarkable outburst of applause from the hundreds

restaurant keepers of San Francisco. The cheering following the pronouncement of sentence was so great that an attempt was made to clear the courtroom, several hundred persons interrupted Judge Dunne half a dozen times and accused the court of unnecessarily humiliating him, and giving opportunity for further humiliation by the reporting of his remarks in the newspapers. Once, replying to the prisoner, Judge Dunne said:

"Such brazen effrontery is probably no more than should be expected."

Attorney Morgan, who protested in Schmitz's behalf, was admonished that another interruption would provoke a jail sentence for contempt of court. Before sentence was pronounced, Attorney Parrish, for Schmitz, made a motion for a new trial, which was denied.

Schmitz showed very little feeling when sentence was pronounced, and immediately began a statement to the newspaper men.

Schmitz dictated a statement to the Associated Press charging Judge Dunne with prejudice and that it was impossible to secure a fair trial. He asked that the public withhold judgment until proceedings are brought before the highest court. He declared he will fight the case step by step; that his own conscience is free and that he expects a successful outcome of his appeal. Further, he said he would be a candidate for re-election at the mayoralty election this fall and will abide by the verdict expressed at the polls.

Judge Dunne will hear arguments for application for bail tomorrow.

NEW \$25,000 BUILDING FOR DIVINITY SCHOOL

WILL BE ERECTED THIS FALL IN
NORTHWEST CORNER OF
SCHOOLS BLOCK, FACING
ELEVENTH STREET

Will Be Built of Brick or Stone, Sixty by Eighty Feet in Dimensions, and Three Stories High—Five Thousand Dollars Raised by Local Christian Church

A \$25,000 brick or stone building will be erected in Eugene this coming fall by the Eugene Divinity School.

Dean E. C. Sanderson and the regents of the school have been quietly working on the project for the past several months and have now reached a point where they feel sure of its success. Already a good sum has been raised for the building, the Christian church of this city alone having subscribed over \$5,000. A canvas of the Pacific Northwest will at once begin, and it is hoped by the time the building is completed next winter to have enough money raised so that there will not be a cent of debt upon it.

The new building will be located on the northwest corner of the Divinity School block and will face East Eleventh street. It will be 60x80 feet in dimensions, three stories high, and the material to be used, whether stone or brick, will be determined upon within a few days. Plans will be once placed in the hands of the architect and it will not be long before the contract for construction is let. It is expected that work on the structure will begin some time next month.

It is planned to make the new building one of the finest in the city, and one that will compare favorably with any of those of the University of Oregon. It will be an imposing edifice, an ornament to that portion of the city, which is already adorned with the handsome buildings of the university, the Patterson public school and numerous fine residences.

The Divinity School has made a wonderful growth since it was organized here twelve years ago, and has outgrown the present building, which was erected the next year after the school was started. The old building is a very good one and will still be used when the new one is completed.

The school owns the entire block upon which the buildings are located except the northeast corner, which is

owned by the Y. M. C. A. of the university, which intends to erect a fine association house there some time in the future.
