NEW \$18,000 PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH BUILDING

PLANS FOR HANDSOME AND IMPOSING EDIFICE BEING COMPLETED BY ARCHITECT HUNZICKER.

Will Be Built of Stone at Corner of East Tenth and Pearl Streets—Plans Will Be Ready for Contractors in Two Weeks and Building Will Be Finished in Fall

Architect John Hunziker is completing the plans for the new house of worship to be erected by the Central Presbyterian church at the corner of East Tenth and Pearl streets, and if adopted by the congregation they will be ready for the contractors to figure on in about two weeks. The building will be completed some time this fall.

The church will be far the costliest and the most commodious in the city. It will be built of stone and will cost approximately \$18,000. It will seat approximately 100 people, which is a hundred or more greater than the seating capacity of the largest church building in the city at present.

The new edifice will be Gothic in design, a general description of it being as follows: The dimensions over all will be 80x110 feet. The auditorium will have a seating capacity of 380, seven Sunday school rooms adjoining the auditorium and which are connected with it by folding doors, will seat 350 and the gallery on three sides of the auditorium will seat 340. There will be rooms for parlor and study and in the basement there will be a kitchen, a dining room, storerooms, boiler rooms, etc. The building will face east, with entrances from that direction and from the north. In the northeast corner there will be a Gothic tower. After the plans are completed a more minute description of the building can be obtained but suffice it to say, it will be very handsome and an ornament to the city.

GOOD BALL GAMES PROMISED FOR SUNDAY

The Eugene and Coburg teams of the Lane county league will play one of the regular games of the series at Recreation Park in this city Sunday afternoon. The Coburg team is at present at the bottom of the percentage column, but it has been strengthened very materially since it played the Colts last, and a good exhibition is promised. Manager McCormick has secured the services of big Rube Saunders, the famous Chemawa foot-

ball and baseball player, who will, as in the game at Springfield last Sunday, hold down the first sack for the Colts. DeNeffe, the crack subpitcher, whom Walter McCredie, manager of the Portland team of the Coast League, has been endeavoring to secure, will pitch Sunday. The game will be one of the best of the series.

Game at Springfield.
The next game at Springfield will be played Sunday between the Blues and the Roseburg Models. A month ago the Roseburg team was defeated by Eugene by a 4 to 3 score and as Eugene has defeated Springfield 3 to 2 this game next Sunday should be a corker. Since Eugene defeated Roseburg, however, the latter has been strengthened considerably, and the Blues will have to play ball all the time to win. The Roseburg boys will reach Springfield Saturday night and will be given a dance, to which Eugene people are welcome.

BAND CONCERT AND LAWN SOCIAL

This evening on the beautiful lawn at the McMurphy residence, north of the depot, which has been elaborately decorated for the occasion. Brilliant lights and numerous Chinese lanterns, hung amongst the unlimited amount of fine shrubbery, will transform the place into a fairyland worth seeing.

On this lawn is the only blooming magnolia tree in the Willamette valley, and a dozen or so blooms will be on exhibition during the evening.

The Eugene Military Band will furnish a large amount of its justly celebrated music during the evening. Ice cream in freshly made cones, pop corn, home-made candy and other dainties will be obtainable, and not least of all a number of newly imported French giveties will be on hand to entertain the thousands who will be present.

A magnificent present will be given away free to the first fifty people entering the grounds, and beautiful souvenirs will be handed out to later arrivals. This is not a private affair. The Society of the Congregational Church, which will be in charge during the day and evening, asks all who may desire to spend a pleasant and comfortable evening and enjoy the fine music to come. The admission will be but 10 cents.

FOUR MEN HURT AT EUGENE LUMBER CO.'S SAWMILL

There came near being a serious accident at the Eugene Lumber Company's sawmill this morning. As it was, several men were painfully injured and one or two of them will be unable to work for several days. The horses hitched to the slab wood wagon, while standing at the mill, became frightened at something and started to run. The wagon struck one of the posts supporting the elevated tramway on which a number of the mill men were standing, causing it to fall to the ground, ten feet below. J. B. Hopkins, one of the proprietors of the mill, suffered a severe strain of the back, G. W. Billmire had a big nail run through his left arm, and Irving Courtwright and Owen Bray were more or less bruised up. Mr. Hopkins and Mr. Billmire will probably not be able to be at the mill for some time on account of their injuries. Dr. F. M. Day was called to attend the injured men.

NO PRUNES GOING TO WASTE

High Prices Induce Careful Harvesting Among Oregon Growers.

Salem, Or., July 10.—Fruit dealers and packers predict for this year the largest pack of prunes in the history of prune culture in the Willamette valley. This, however, does not necessarily mean that the yield will be the largest; on the contrary, the yield will not be equal to that of last year, but the prices are so high that every prune of a merchantable quality will be taken care of and the percentage of waste will be reduced to a minimum.

In other years, when prices were practically on a level with the cost of production, or a shade higher, the growers were not so particular, and great quantities of fruit were allowed to go to waste either on the trees or the ground. Early varieties of cherries and berries are also carefully harvested and marketed this year. One instance of a case of this character is cited, where a prominent cherry grower who has not heretofore taken the trouble to market the fruit because of the small profit, realized over \$1000 from his crop this year.

Cherries, loganberries and phenomials are moving from this point in large quantities and the season has proved the longest and most profitable to the growers of all fruits in many years. No estimate of the probable prune crop of this section of the state has as yet been ventured by either dealers or fruit association officials.
