Portland Market Report.

Portland, Or., July 11.—The initial carload shipment of watermelons for this market this season left Southern California for the north about a week ago, and was due to reach the city yesterday. The car was sighted at Ashland three days ago, and since that time has been slowly coming down the Willamette valley. The shipment is consigned to the Pearson-Page Co.

A few early watermelons came in crates about a week ago, and they sold at prices that made them a luxury. It is announced that today's shipment will sell at 2 1/2 cents loose and 3 cents a pound crate, and it is believed that at these prices the carload will not last long in this market. Two more carloads of watermelons are on their way from California.

and one of them may be in the latter part of the week.

Cantaloupes are more plentiful today than at any other time this season, several carloads having arrived from the south the past few days. Most of the receipts are Brawleys and Coachellas. The former sell at \$2.50 to \$3.50 a crate and the latter at \$3 to \$3.25. The supply today is so large that peddlers are carrying a good many on their wagons.

Cherries Are Coming in Freely.

Offerings of cherries on Front street today are the largest seen thus far this year, and a good proportion of the fruit is of the Bing and Lambert varieties, which are favorites here. These cherries, which had just begun ripening at the time of the heavy rain a week ago, appear not to have been seriously damaged by the downpour. The yield in this part of the state is large, and these cherries are the finest that have been seen in the local market. Bings sell at 8 cents a pound and Lamberts at 10.

Loganberries Are Steadier.

A steadier tone is ruling in loganberries today, especially for the better quality. Poor stock is hard to sell at any price and arrivals of this character would not bring more than 60c or 75c at any time. The reason for the enormous shipments in this direction of late is that the berries have ripened too fast and they could not be sent longer distances. As a usual rule a large amount of local loganberries is annually sent to Spokane and other points, but if this was tried during the past few days the railroad tracks the entire distance to the inland empire would be colored scarlet because of the heavy condition of the fruit.

Strawberry Season Is Ended.

Practically no strawberries are now being received in this market, and the season is closed. A Hood River paper thus reviews the situation:

The strawberry season has practically closed in Hood River for this year. However, there are still daily consignments going forward by express.

This year's crop has been practically 100 per cent larger than the berry output of last year. The total strawberry crop of 1906 was about 28 carloads; the crop this year will amount to about 35 cars.

The prices that have prevailed this year have not been as large as those received last year. This is due mainly to the fact that the places in Washington and Montana that have been our most open market in former years are now being supplied by local growers in their respective vicinities.

The state of Washington, that was at one time one of the heaviest consumers, has shipped hundreds of carloads of berries into the Eastern market this year, and the Bitter Root country in Montana has also had a heavy yield this season.

Poultry Market Is Higher.

On account of the very liberal demand and generally small arrivals on the street, the poultry market in general shows an advance of about 1/2c a pound in price today. Hens are quoted up to 14c a pound and springs range around 16c and 17c.

The egg market continues mixed, with values showing a range of about 2 cents on account of quality. Most sales at 14c, although once in a while a case is sold fractionally higher and a large lot fractionally lower. Business in eggs, however, is generally dull, the market showing little movement on account of the Eastern arrivals.

Creamery butter and cheese are holding. Former is very firm. Dressed veal continues very scarce and prices are firmer, though unchanged.

Three Million Pounds of Wool Sold.

To date this year 3,000,000 pounds of wool have changed hands at the pool sales at Shaniko, about 3,000,000 pounds having been sold there yesterday. The highest price paid there this year was 21 1/2 cents. It is estimated that the wool men of the district about Shaniko have this year received approximately \$600,000 for their wool and \$125,000 for the sheep they have shipped to market.

Portland Livestock Market.

Livestock receipts at local yards today were: Cattle, 175; sheep, 60; calves, 75; lambs, 75. The market generally is steady at the ruling prices yesterday. ENDEAVORERS RECEIVE MESSAGE FROM PRESIDENT

not for the trained myriads or Christian Endeavorers who for a quarter of a century have been exemplifying the broad idea of training for the service of the kingdom of God.

This, I think we may say, was the great thought which the Christian Endeavor movement introduced into the church life of the day, or at least the great undeveloped thought which it emphasized twenty-five years ago, and which it has continued to emphasize ever since. It is the training school of the church as a Sunday school is the training school of the church.

The successes of Christian Endeavor have come in proportion as this thought has been developed; its failures have resulted from ignoring this principle.

"I have just returned from a long and arduous pioneering journey in the 'Neglected Continent,' neglected to the last by Christian Endeavor as well as by other Protestant forces; but I have found that there, among the Andes and on the pampas, in the busy cities of this continent of opportunity, a far better name for South America, as well as where Christian Endeavor has been known and prized the longest, there as well as here and everywhere else, I say, the supreme work of the society is training the church of the future.

"Personal experience, too, has shown me that in Europe and Asia and Africa and the islands of the sea the society has no greater mission. We may say, then, that this is a universal principle, and well deserves the foremost place in our consideration.

"On the border line between the republics of Chile and Argentina, on the crest of the Andes, where the only pass over the mountains is more than 12,000 feet nearer the stars, stands a gigantic figure of our Lord Christ holding His Cross and with His upraised finger pointing every traveler to the skies. It was erected to celebrate the conclusion of the boundary dispute between the two republics which long threatened a disastrous war. On the base of the statue are symbolic figures of the two republics in bas-relief, representing Argentina and Chile clasping hands, and underneath is the motto: 'He is our peace, who hath made both one.'

"This may well be our motto, too. He, the Lord Jesus Christ, is our peace; and He hath made us all one—all denominations, all nations, one in endeavor for him.

"He is our peace, who hath made us all one."
