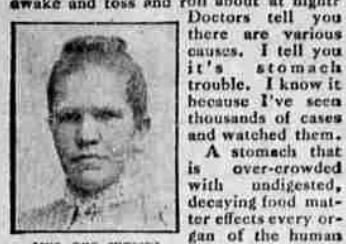

THE MILITIA BOYS DOWN AT FORT STEVENS

EUGENE COMPANIES WHO ARE DOWN BY THE SOUNDING SEA LEARNING USE OF BIG GUNS HEARD FROM

Company C Assigned to Battery Lewis With 34th Company of Coast Artillery as Instructors, and Company A to Battery Clark. With 93d Company as Instructors.

(Special Correspondence.) Fort Stevens, Or., July 19.—Little of interest happened on the way to Fort Stevens. From Portland a special train carried the seven companies to Astoria, at which place Companies A, of Baker City, and M, of Salem, crossed over to Fort Columbia, the other companies proceeding to Fort Stevens, and arrived here about 5 o'clock.

During the trip down between Eugene and Portland some one suggested that now was the time to put Policeman Purdy in jail, so a detail of five men, with Corporal Riley in charge, proceeded to do so. Eugene should be proud of the fighting ability of its police force if the resistance that Policeman Purdy gave is a fair sample of what they can furnish. It took thirty minutes and Will White's breath to accomplish it—in fact, Bill was so much subdued that the boys could not get him interested in the wood saws that they called his attention to. Bill is a hopeless case; we'll bring him home.

The companies unloaded as soon as arriving at the station and with very little delay were soon on the march to the respective quarters, where tents were put up and details made, and by 7 o'clock the men had supper and had some knowledge of the kind of work they would have during their stay.

The following organizations are in camp at Fort Stevens: Companies A, C and K, Third Infantry, O. N. G., Portland, and Companies A and C, First Separate Battalion, O. N. G., Eugene.

Assignment of Companies Company C, of Eugene, is assigned to Battery Lewis, with the 34th Company, coast artillery, as instructors. Company A, of Eugene, is assigned to Battery Clark, with the 93d Coast

Artillery as instructors. Company A is assigned to duty as follows: Battery commander, Captain C. C. Hammond. Range officer, Lieutenant Raymond Babb. Emplacement officer, Lieutenant John Rennie. Firing commander's detail, Privates Bower, Evans, Johnson and Zinn.

Primary station, Sergeant Farnish, Privates Callison, White, Atkins, Gaby, Parker, Perdue, Purdy. Battery commander detail, Private Robins.

Secondary station, Corporal Hinton, Private James Harris. Booth detail, recorder, Corporal Henderson; telegraph operator, Corporal Perdue.

Mortar detail, pit A, Quartermaster Sergeant Faust. Mortar detail, pit B, gun commander, First Sergeant Pryor; mechanic, Private West; gun pointer, Corporal Branstetter; gunner, Corporal Riley; assistants, Privates Clark, Drain, Fuller, Gilkey, Knox, Love, Morris, Oldham, Patterson.

Ammunition detail, Privates Spang, Walker, Gilstrap. Submarine detail, Cooks Gibbs and Sellers.

Everybody seems to be in good spirits and anticipate a pleasant and instructive camp. The officers and enlisted men of the artillery are very considerate of the National Guard and are showing them every courtesy and kindness possible.

GUARDSMEN PROFICIENT WITH COAST GUNS

Fort Stevens, July 11.—Such rapid progress has been made by the Oregon troop learning the handling of the mortar batteries at the fort that target practice with steel projectiles was held yesterday and tomorrow a mimic bombardment will be commenced.

The target practice yesterday was by mixed gun crews of regulars and guardsmen, and remarkable results were obtained. A certain area was prescribed as a target, and shell after shell was dropped into the proper spot, very few going wide of their mark.

The government tug, Guy Howard, will be sent to sea tomorrow with instructions to run in and out day and night. The forts will be equipped with blank ammunition and will be on guard awaiting her arrival. The tug is to represent a hostile fleet and will attempt to make the entrance to the harbor without being detected and sunk by the guns at the fort.

COBURG BASEBALL TEAM IS MUCH BETTER

Coburg people are coming over to Eugene in large numbers to see the baseball game between the Giants of that little city and the Colts of Eugene. Their team has undergone a radical change since it played Eugene last and the wise ones are betting their money on the sayalliers. It has been given out that the election of a secretary would be carried over to the next meeting, next Wednesday, on account of a division upon candidates, but during the course of the meeting, an organization in support of Starr and against the candidacy of Superintendent E. T. Moore, of this county, having been quietly formed before the board convened, the question came up rather suddenly and was put to a vote with the result that Starr was elected by a vote of 5 to 2.
