REGULAR ARMY MEN COMPLIMENT COMPANY A.

MEMBERS OF EUGENE MILITIA COMPANY MAKE GOOD SHOWING WITH BIG GUNS

Camp Will Be Broken Monday Morning and Our Boys Are Expected Home That Night—Life at Fort Is Full of Excitement—Rumors of Night Attacks

(Special Correspondence.)
Fort Stevens, Or., July 11.—Company A is settling down to the work of handling a battery in good shape and have received many compliments from the regulars. In fact, the work is of such a nature that one is interested enough that he hardly knows what other organizations are doing, so that a letter is almost sure to be entirely of his own company, and being identified with Company A I am from this condition only able to furnish news of that organization.
Lieutenant Babbs and Quartermaster Sergeant Faust's families arrived in camp Tuesday and are visitors for a few days.
Captain Percy Willis, a major in the Second Oregon Volunteer Infantry, and Lieutenant Cooper, a private in Company D, Second Oregon, who

no doubt will be remembered by members of that organization, are on duty here as officers in the coast artillery.

Among the National Guard officers that will be remembered by veteran National Guardsmen and Second Oregon members are Lieutenant Colonel Poorman, Major May, Captain Knapp, Captain Broches and Lieutenant Lebow.

There is a rumor that Quartermaster Sergeant Dillard of Company C, had one of his privates looking all over the fort for the key to the parade grounds one day. Just how long the man hunted we have not heard, but the sergeant increased his reputation as a sober-faced josh to quite an extent.
Company had a sub-calibre practice

Wednesday, a description of which might be of interest if taken in connection with the Oregonian's account and the company's detail as given in a previous letter. First let me explain that to find the range of an object that there are two stations, a primary and a secondary. At each station an "Asimuth" instrument is installed. These instruments measure the number of degrees and hundredths of degrees an object is from a given or datum point, and the reports of each instrument go simultaneously over telephones to the plotting board, where the exact distance of the object is figured out, which is phoned to the guns and they are trained on the object and fired. If the target is moving there is an electric ticker that ticks in both stations at the same time every twenty minutes and the asimuth is sent three times a minute, from which it is figured the range and speed of the object. Supposing a ship was entering the Columbia river and the battery commander wanted to track it, this is what would occur in the tower in which I am stationed: One man would be in charge of the instrument, the other man would have a telephone receiver fastened on his head and a transmitter swinging just below his mouth. The man at the phone would receive and give the man at the instrument instructions something like this: "Ship entering river just outside of bar." The instrument man would swing the glass around until he caught the front spar of the ship, when he would announce: "Target identified," which the other man would phone in and receive instructions to "track" and answer "next reading," and from that on the instrument would be kept on the forward spar and the asimuth read at the sound of the ticker every twenty minutes until instructions to "cease tracking" were given.
This is what happened in the secondary station Wednesday, all the instructions and commands coming over the phone. "Prepare for drill," "drill will be sub-calibre practice," "after command fire, flight of projectile will be 637 seconds," give asimuth of target," "take asimuth of splash." We heard the first command of fire, but found no splash, as they had overshoot quite a ways. The next shot we caught and from that on they kept getting closer, correcting their aim each time as the report of their last shot was sent in, and in this manner Company A, a National Guard company, after three days in camp, won the compliments of the officers and men of the regular army, doing target practice with a mortar battery.

The next three days are to be full of excitement, as there are rumors of attacks, calling to arms and battle maneuvering. Government pay is also scheduled for Friday.
Every one seems to be enjoying himself and the routine work is moving along smoothly.
We break camp Monday morning and will arrive home that night, probably on the local.

Richard Sharp and Ray Mellargue, of Brownsville, were arrested at Halsey Thursday night charged with the robbery of Anderson's jewelry store and Warner's hardware store at Brownsville Tuesday night.
Sharp and Mellargue bought tickets at Halsey for Portland before the burglary, going back to Brownsville, and then going to Portland, it is said, on Wednesday, and returning Thursday afternoon on Halsey, when the Brownsville people were notified and a constable went over to Halsey and made the arrest, it being thought that the circumstances justified it.
Sharp resides near Brownsville and is 28 years of age. Mellargue, now 21, is a son of ex-Sheriff Mellargue, and resided in Albany for two years.
The theory is that if they did it they took the jewelry to Portland and disposed of it. The matter will be investigated.—Albany Democrat.

BIG INCREASE IN BUSINESS OF POSTOFFICE

FIFTEEN PER CENT MORE STAMP SALES FOR YEAR ENDING JUNE 30 THAN IN PREVIOUS YEAR.

Lacked Only \$860 of Reaching Point for \$100 Increase in Postmaster's Salary—Money Order Business Shows Much Greater Rate of Increase Than Stamp Sales.

The business of the Eugene postoffice for the fiscal year ending June 30 shows a good increase over that of the previous year. Postmaster J. L. Page today kindly furnished the Guard with the figures on the amount of stamp sales for the two years, that part of the business alone figuring in the rating of the office. The sales for the year ending June 30, 1906, were \$16,653.35, and for the year ending June 30, 1907, they were \$19,234.60, an increase of \$2,581.25, or at the rate of a trifle over fifteen per cent. Had the business been a little less than \$800 more during the last year the postmaster would have been granted an increase of \$100 per year in salary. The salary is now \$2,500. By the end of next year the \$20,000 mark will have been reached and the salary increased.
The money order business does not

count in the rating of the postoffice. The rate of increase in that line during the past year was very much greater than that of the stamp sales. Postmaster Page says the amount paid out by him in cashing money orders was a quarter of a million dollars more during the year than he received for the purchase of orders. The recent increase in this business is due largely to the fact that the office of head banker of the Woodmen of the World, held by P. E. Snodgrass, has been located here, and most of the money sent him goes through the postoffice.
