At his home in Springfield Friday evening at 11 o'clock, William H. Fletcher, aged 65 years, after an illness of over 17 years, caused by cancer of the eye.

Deceased was born in Knox county, Ohio, December 20, 1842, where he lived with his parents until 1849, when the family left for Missouri, where they remained until 1852, when they decided to emigrate West, crossing the plains by ox team. They spent six months in crossing the plains, but finally landed at Vancouver after a long and tiresome journey. Thomas J. Fletcher, father of the deceased, then decided to make this their camping place, and with his family remained there for twenty years. From there the family moved to Independence, where the deceased went into business for himself, running at different times a livery barn, hotel and meat market. He next moved to Pilot Rock, and engaged in farming and was later married to Elizabeth R. Keeney in 1874. In January, 1907, he, with his family, moved to Springfield, and though he was bedfast from his long sickness, his wife, with the assistance of his brother, A. J. Fletcher, run the Elk restaurant.
