BUILDING OF REAL CITY, THE GREATER EUGENE, COMMENCED TODAY

The work was commenced today
that in a few months will result in
making Eugene a real city—with
modern paved streets and electric
cars. Before the first of next year we
will be so far in advance of any other
town in Oregon, outside of Portland,
in the matter of public improvements
and municipal conveniences that hun-
dreds of the better class of immi-
grants to the West will be attracted
to make investments and homes here
in the metropolis of the upper Wil-
lamette, the modern city, with its
up-to-date schools and churches, its
mills, factories and mercantile estab-
lishments, its paved streets and elec-
tric cars.

Admittedly the greatest project
actually on foot is the railroad to the
Siuslaw, which will soon be under
construction, because this will result
in the location here of many new en-
terprises which will call for the in-
vestment of capital, and employment
of labor. But there are many other
things that will contribute to Eu-
gene's prosperity and growth, among
them being the large Palmer sawmill,
and building operations which in-
clude a costly general hospital on Col-
lege Hill, the new Divinity school
building, federal building, new uni-
versity buildings, the costly Presbyter-
ian church and numerous fine resi-
dences, all under way or assured to
be commenced during the summer.
In addition to these are many other
improvements that are almost certain
to go ahead, under the stimulus of
railroad building and permanent
business volume.

No city located anywhere on earth
ever had a brighter future than Eu-
gene faces at the present time, and
if our businessmen and property own-
ers will but keep step with the march
of progress and pull together for the
common good, this large country
town will grow without a set-back or
pause into a city of 25,000 people
during the next five years, and those
who have property holdings now or
an established business will be the
beneficiaries of increased values and
prosperity.

If you live in Eugene pin your
faith to its future; talk for it; work
for it; invest your money in its prop-
erty and buildings and splendid
results are sure to follow.

sident of Lane county to extend to the
promoters and builders of the Sius-
law railroad every possible assis-
tance. The securing rights of way and
other matters of essential import-
ance, the good will and co-operation
of the people may be of material as-
sistance, and furthermore, it will be
an encouragement to those capitalists
who are investing their money in it
to feel that the public is backing
their efforts and will do its share
to make it a success. Always it
should be borne in mind that this will
be a railroad owned and managed by
the people of Lane county.

TELEPHONE FRANCHISE IN CITY OF COBURG

The council of Coburg will decide
this evening whether or not the Pa-
cific Telephone Company shall be
granted a franchise. Considerable
discussion has been created by the
request of the company for a fran-
chise, and one document, granting
certain privileges has been turned
down by the city fathers. The trou-
ble seemed to be caused by the term
electric wires, which part of the res-
idents of the McKenzie metropolis
thought might give the telephone
company the right to run a trolley
line or an electric light plant. To
avoid this the protecting fathers of
the little city have had inserted a
clause by which, in case the said com-
pany should override the orders of
the council the franchise may be for-
feited at the pleasure of the city. It
is considered likely that this amend-
ed telephone people will be suc-
cessful.
